Each year, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason invites those involved in law

Off-ramp construction continues

Bud Akins gave an update on the Haralson Development Project in the December meeting of the Blairsville Downtown Development Authority's Board of Directors.

Akins spent years working with the Georgia Department of Transportation and is currently overseeing development of the new off ramp.

"We've had a lot of rain this fall, but I think we're coming along great," said Akins. "I'm satisfied with all of the work that they've done."

One of the next steps in construction will be installing the curbs and gutters of the ramp, which will be done by machine to expedite the process, though weather will play

a big role as far as when the ramp will reach completion.

"If it gets down to 20 degrees, the ground's going to freeze, and you're not going to be able to put the asphalt down," said Akins, highlighting the importance of continued good weather in finishing the job soon. "There might come a time that you have to

Star Wars debuts at Blairsville Cinema

Hundreds of area residents lined up outside the Blairsville Cinema on Thursday, Dec. 17, each patiently waiting to take part in a multi-generational happening more than 30 years in the making.

Those who attended the premiere in Blairsville were not alone - nationally, *Star Wars VII: The Force Awakens* broke the record for domestic ticket sales in its opening weekend, bringing in a whopping \$238 million.

The latest installment in the franchise reunites cast and crew that last filmed together for *Return of the Jedi* in 1983, which some of those in attendance were fortunate enough to have seen in theaters.

Kate VanOrsdal, 65, and Kathy Thompson, 71, both of Blue Ridge, remem-

"Oh my God, it's *Star Wars* - we wouldn't miss it," said VanOrsdal just before the premiere. "We were young

people when this first started, so we've seen them all."

In fact, VanOrsdal and Thompson have seen every *Star Wars* movie in theaters - now all seven - and attending Thursday was an important part of maintaining that legacy.

"If you're there for the first night, it's more of a party," said Thompson, who posed for pictures clashing lightsabers with VanOrsdal. "I have friends that envy me, because they thought it wasn't starting until tomorrow night."

Many fans decided to dress up for the occasion, going all out to celebrate opening night in true Jedi fashion. Aaron Donnelly, 23, and Ryan Oquendo, 25, showed up in costume for the premiere in a group of 15 friends, and all were equally excited for the film to start.

"For me, I'm really looking forward to what they can do with the special effects, kind of bringing *Star Wars* into the modern era," said Oquendo, whose Jedi outfit was styled after Luke Skywalker in *Episode VI*.
