For the second-straight year, Murphy, NC spoils Union's hopes of reaching the finals

Hiawassee - The 7th ranked Lady Panthers (11-2) won two-of-three at the Battle of the States to finish third for the second time in three years.

Union County's only loss came in the second round at the hands of undefeated Murphy, North Carolina, who jumped out to a 19-7 lead and never looked back, cruising to a 63-39 victory

In Saturday's consolation game, the Lady Panthers rebounded from its second loss of the year with a 66-41 blowout of Polk County, Tennessee.

Union County was never challenged en route to its thirdplace finish, leading 19-6 after one and 40-16 at the break.

The tournament opened with another one-sided victory, this one a 75-38 rout of Walhalla, South Carolina that saw the Lady Panthers score 25, 21 and 23 points in each of the first three quarters, building a 69-29 advantage.

"If we can settle down and play our style of basketball, we're going to be just fine (when region play resumes)," head coach Crystal Beach said. "We are a difficult team to beat. We are long and fast and the only the way that Murphy loss hurts us is if we don't learn from it and get better.

"(Against Polk) we were moving the ball again like we know how to do. And if we're able to take care of the little things, then we're going to be just fine.'



In Friday's duels action, the shorthanded Panthers forfeited multiple weight classes due to missing several players over the Christmas holidays.


Entering Saturday's individual matches, Union County was near full strength and they brought home five top-four finishes, highlighted by Cristian
