tries have restricted the use of kratom due to the potential for

The fact that kratom is derived from a plant should not lead consumers to be believe it 100% safe and "all-natural". While certainly not all botanicals have dangerous properties, drugs with dangerous effects can come from botanicals, for example, heroin (opium poppy), cocaine (coca leaves), and nicotine (tobacco).

On the Internet, kratom is marketed in a variety of forms: raw leaf, powder, gum, dried in capsules, pressed into tablets, and as a concentrated extract. In the US and Europe, it appears its use is expanding, and recent reports note increasing use by the college-aged population, with availability as close as the nearest convenience store.

Case reports describe the following adverse effects from kratom: addiction, withdrawal, hypothyroidism, and liver injury, aching of muscles and bones and jerky limb movements.

Kratom addiction and chronic use has led to cases of psychosis with hallucinations. delusion, and confusion. Highdose use may lead to fast heart rate (tachycardia) and low blood pressure (hypotension). Tremor, anorexia and weight loss are other possible side effects with long-term use.

Placing kratom Schedule I would place it in the same category as heroin, LSD or marijuana, and prevent access for medical research, a concern for many experts, consumers, and advocacy groups. Lack of quality scientific evidence confounds the evaluation of the safety of kratom. Concerns also exist that the general public would not be able to identify or confirm the quality or purity of kratom from any Internet source.

The FDA has warned consumers not to use any products labeled as containing kratom. As of February 2018, the FDA has reported on 44 related deaths linked with kratom use, often in use with other substances.

either ionization, photoelectric, or both sensing systems to detect a fire.

Ionization-type smoke alarms have a small amount of radioactive material between two electrically charged plates which ionize the air and cause current to flow between the plates. When smoke enters the chamber, it disrupts the flow of ions, reducing the flow of current and activating the alarm. Photoelectric-type alarms aim a light source into a sensing chamber at an angle away from the sensor. Smoke enters the chamber, scattering light onto the light sensor and triggering the alarm. Photoelectric alarms respond slightly faster to smoldering fires; ionization alarms respond slightly faster to flaming fires. Ionization alarms are less expensive and the most widely used.

Smoke alarms are appliances, just like toasters, televisions, and furnaces. Unlike other appliances, these devices function quietly in the background, and its alarm, in response to a real smoke situation or to testing, is the only evidence that it works.

A television that will not play will not lead to tragedy, but a smoke alarm that fails to sound in a fire, could. Roughly half of the smoke alarms collected as inoperable and studied in the National Smoke Detector Project were more than 10 years old, hence older than the currently recommended replacement age. Alarms designed solely to detect smoke should be replaced every 10

Buying, installing, testing, and maintaining home smoke alarms is essential protection from fire, but it is not enough. Many households have not developed the escape plans that would allow them to use the extra warning time smoke alarms provide effectively. Escape plans identify any obstacles to secondary exits if the main door is blocked, a meeting place outside the home for household members to gather, and makes provisions for household members who need help.

We can "Firewise" the outside of our homes to lower the risk of destruction by a wildfire, but we also need to protect our families on the inside by installing, maintaining, and regularly testing our smoke alarms that are our first-line of defense against fire and smoke while we sleep.

This should be true of anyone who acquires the requisite legal permits and puts that revolver or that pistol in her or his holster. We should feel a weightiness, a heaviness, a burden of great responsibility -- and we should shudder at the idea of actually pulling that weapon on anyone.

The person who is hesitant to carry a gun, who loathes the thought of actually ever having to use it -- but decides that (s)he will take on the burden of carrying for the sake of potentially being in a position to protect himself or his neighbor, if absolutely necessary and unavoidable -- that is the person who carries out of Love. (S)he is the type of person we should want to carry a gun. To carry in this mind of service is actually a way to follow the command to bear one another's burdens.

It is indeed a burden to carry a gun. It requires sig-

nificant and inescapable forethought, regular training and planning: what to carry, how to carry it, how to conceal it, where to go, where not to go. Carrying is a limit that the carriers put upon themselves for the sake of others. If one is unwilling to take on this burden -- the strain of forethought, self-restraint, and willingness to intercede if necessary, and only if necessary -- then one should not carry a gun.

Let me live out my life without having to resort to drawing a firearm. Please.

With the right motivation and posture, one can bless his or her community by living life with a gun in her or his holster. Violence may be stopped in its tracks. Neighbors may be protected. Evil might be interdicted. Lives might be saved.

It is an act of personal responsibility and of extended
