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School board approves bid for ESPLOST projects

Thanks to the ESPLOST and the Board of Education, both the Union County middle and high schools will be receiving some additions.

In their December regular meeting, the board voted unanimously to approve a bid of roughly \$7.5 million for completion of three ESPLOST projects.

The projects will include

a new floor of classrooms plus heating and air replacement at the high school, as well as additional classrooms at the middle school.

Bowen & Watson made the winning bid, and representatives present in the meeting told the board that they had decided to bid on the projects all together to save the school system money by avoiding having to pay multiple worksite superintendents for the separate projects.

The work on the high school will tentatively begin when school lets out in May.

Union County Schools Superintendent Dr. Fred Rayfield said that the system would be receiving \$1.1 million in state funding in the fall of 2017 to go toward reimbursement of the HVAC installation at the high school, and that they should still have about \$1.7 million of ESPLOST money left over for other projects if collection rates remain roughly the same through next year.

Because of the large price of the bid – more than \$7 million – Board Chair Gary Davenport with Board Member Cindy Odom expressed that the board had previously promised taxpayers that they would not bond into debt to complete SPLOST-funded projects for the school system.

This “pay-as-you-go” promise was made by the entire board several years ago, said Davenport in the pre-meeting work session, and Dr. Rayfield assured board members that they would

have enough money to cover the cost of the project with ESPLOST reserves left over in the end.

Also, Davenport expressed his desire to see air conditioning installed in the elementary school gym, which is a request he said he's been hearing from taxpayers for several years now.

Davenport, who was recognized in that December meeting for his 20 years of service as a member of the Union County Board of Education, officially came off the board at the end of December.

The current ESPLOST collection runs out in September of 2018, and

the board briefly discussed gearing up sometime soon to look at the possibility of proposing another ESPLOST to succeed the current one.

Associate Superintendent Dr. Jeremy Williams gave a presentation in the December work session on the schools' results from the



Wildfires contained, drought remains

Just before Christmas, Richard Russell Scenic Highway (Georgia 348) saw one last wildfire for the 2016 calendar year, caused by a car crash on Dec. 23.

Union County Fire Department and the U.S. Forest Service quickly responded to the accident, managing to contain the flames before too much damage was caused, though an estimated 200 acres

have been affected by the fire. As of press time, the fire has yet to be completely extinguished, but officials have it contained and it is being closely monitored by the USFS for precautionary measures.

There were no homes or structures that were affected by the flames during the initial outburst of the fires, but the acreage burned did cause closures to the Appalachian Trail from Neel's Gap to Tesnatee Gap.

Residents have been very generous to the Union County Food Pantry – it remained stocked throughout the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

“There is a kid somewhere that, some nights, goes to sleep hungry,” said Sullivan. “A kid that doesn't have what we have, doesn't

have the peanut butter or the jelly, and that's normal for that kid.”

And from now until closer to spring, the nights will only get colder for that hungry kid.

Sullivan is the community resource coordinator for Ninth District Opportunity, Inc., though she also runs the food pantry out of the Haralson Memorial Civic Center near Downtown Blairsville.

The Union County Food Pantry relies 100 percent on donations, with not a single taxpayer dollar going toward the purchase of food for hungry residents who utilize the pantry.

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Ann Sullivan is the community resource coordinator for Ninth District Opportunity, and she's also in charge of the Union County Food Pantry inside the Haralson Memorial Civic Center.
