"Our mission is to educate, encourage and empower young women who are thinking about an abortion to choose life," Center Director Davis said. "We want them to know that they have choices.


"We talk to them about better options, like adoption. If now is not the time for you to start a family or take care of a child, then adoption is a wonderful, loving mother choice. We try to present them with choices that they won't regret.'

Davis said the Pregnancy Center is coming up on its third anniversary in March.

"We started out as a medical pregnancy center. That is our focus," Davis said. "We've recently added sexually transmitted infection screening. We also offer post-abortion counseling. We offer parenting and relationship counseling. And everything we do is free.

Sen. Gooch said the project will impact the city and that bids will be put out this fall, probably in November.

Typically, when a municipality puts water and sewer lines in the state right of way, they have to agree to move (those lines) at their expense," Gooch said. "Technically, the state could say this is a city responsibility.

"But we're trying to get the state to pay for that relocation because (the entire project is) an economic impact for not only Union County, but for Towns and Fannin as well. It makes sense to go ahead and vehicle.

Officials discussed safe ingress and egress for both sides of Georgia 515 in that same vicinity, incorporating the dual purpose of positive economic development and driver safety in their discussions.

Another potential project considered that day was the installation of a traffic light or roundabout at the other end of Glenn Gooch Bypass, at US 129 South. The senator observed that semitrucks are no longer allowed to pass through downtown, which impacts traffic on the bypass.
