

## Lady Panthers tied for first in 8-AA following perfect week

Hunter scores 18 in the second half as Union races past Fannin County, 62-47

We've passed the halfway point of the region schedule but we're no closer to establishing a clear-cut favorite as five teams remain in contention for the top seed in next month's Region 8-AA Tournament.

On the heels of last week's Putnam County victory over the previously unbeaten Rabun County, a bottleneck has developed atop the region standings with Union County, Putnam and Rabun all tied for first place with one loss each. Sitting two games back of all the congestion is a pair of threeloss teams in Banks County and Elbert County.

However, the standings would look very different today if the Lady Panthers (14-3, 5-1) are unable to survive a 45-40 defensive battle at Banks on Tuesday. As a result, Union once again controls its own destiny in Region 8-AA: Win-out and they're hosting the Region Tournament as the No. 1 seed.

On Friday night, the Lady Panthers made quick work of last-place Oglethorpe County (2-12, 0-7) in a contest that saw Union rest its starters after halftime. A day later, the Lady Panthers were able to dish out a bit of revenge with a 62-47 victory over Fannin County, who handed Union its first loss of the season in December.

Lady Panthers 45, Banks County 40 - Union held off a furious late push by the Lady Leopards, who made things interesting despite trailing by eight points with under two minutes to play.

"I'm quickly learning how tough certain environments are (in this region) and Banks is one of those places, but we did what we had to do to get the win," Union County head coach Crystal Beach said. "We made the necessary adjustments and our girls took care of business."

With 3:47 remaining, Andelin Hill scored in the paint to give Union County a 41-33 lead. From the looks of it, Hill's basket would be more than enough as Banks came up empty on its next three possessions. Unfortunately, the Lady Panthers also found a lid on the basket and were unable to put the game out of reach. Still trailing by eight with 1:40 to play, the Lady Leopards managed to stay alive with a clutch triple. Following a Union miss, Banks County trimmed the margin to 41-38 with a minute left.

The Lady Leopards quickly sliced the Union lead back to three with a layup seven seconds later. Then, following another Lady Panthers' miss, Banks had a chance to tie the game but came up empty as sophomore Riley Allison secured the rebound with 19 seconds left.

After a Union timeout, senior Kait McCarter stepped to the foul line with 14 seconds on the clock and hit a pair of free throws to secure the 45-40

Hunter finished with a game-high 12 points despite going just 1-of-10 from the floor. The bulk of her damage came at the line, where she went a perfect 10-for-10 while grabbing eight rebounds.

Allison and Hill added 9 points apiece with Hill pulling down six boards and blocking two shots. Allison, meanwhile, had three rebounds and three steals. Her 3-point marksmanship played an integral role late in the first half, hitting back-toback treys to turn a 22-20 deficit into a 26-22 advantage. Union points and 11 rebounds. Banks County came out of the break with five-straight points to go back on top 28-26 before a McCarter putback led to a 3-point play and a 29-28 Union lead.

And as Banks rushed back for the final shot, freshman Ellie Cook came up with a steal, and with three-tenths of a second left, she was hacked on a midcourt heave, sending her to the line for three shots. She would make two, giving the Lady Panthers a 33-30 lead after three.

Two Hunter free throws and a three from Cook capped off a 9-0 run as Union built a 38-30 lead with 5:17 remaining. Still ahead 38-33, Allison split a pair of free throws and Hill scored inside for a 41-33 advantage at the 3:47 mark.

Earlier in the game, an Allison putback sparked a 9-2 run to close the first quarter after the Lady Panthers trailed 10-8 with just over three minutes left in the period.

After Allison's offensive board tied the game at 10-10, Hunter hit four free throws and Hill drilled a corner trey in the final seconds to open up a 17-12 advantage after one.

McCarter finished with 7 points, three assists and three steals.

"I think we just started to execute better (in the second half)," Coach Beach said. "We did a better job of finding the gaps and the openings on our cuts. Brooke (Dockrey) also did a great job of executing the offense and making adjustments."

Hunter's hot shooting continued in the fourth quarter, scoring the first four points to open up a double-digit lead at 50-39. After a Lady Rebels' basket, sophomore Rebekah Chambers split a pair of free throws to keep the lead at 10.

Fannin would hit two free throws to cut the deficit to eight but they couldn't find an answer for Hunter, who scored consecutive baskets for a 55-45 lead at the 2:46 mark.

Hill sank a pair at the charity stripe and Hunter went 1-for-2 to extend the Union County advantage to 58-45 with 1:38 remaining.

**Up next** - Union County will visit Elbert County on Tuesday before hosting Monticello on Friday. The game of the week will be Saturday when they travel to Putnam County to makeup the Jan. 4 cancelation.

Union defeated Elbert County 58-46 in December. but the Lady Blue Devils have gone 9-2 since that trip to Blairsville.

Meanwhile, Monticello is going in the other direction, dropping eight of nine since its 56-39 loss to the Lady Panthers.

Finally, Putnam County is currently 14-2 and 5-1 in region. The Lady War Eagles are coming off a 58-54 home win over Rabun County. On Tuesday, Putnam County will host Banks County, who is responsible for Putnam's lone region loss.

Saturday's showdown with Union County will conclude a six-game homestand for the Lady War Eagles, who finish with three of their final four games on the road.

Tip-off is scheduled for 5 p.m. Tuesday at Elbert County, 6 p.m. Friday vs Monticello and 2 p.m. Saturday at Putnam County.

Speaking of Putnam, after hosting Banks on Tuesday, the Lady War Eagles welcome Social Circle on Friday night.
