Panthers end four-game slide with late run vs Andrews, NC Spartans shoot the lights out as Union County falls 75-31 at Greater Atlanta Christian

The Panthers (14-6, 3-5) welcomed back sophomore Sawyer Drake on Saturday night as they ended a four-game skid with a 52-37 victory over Andrews, NC.

As close to full strength as they've been in two weeks, Union County needed all the help they could get to fend off a hot-shooting, upset-minded Wildcats squad.

"It was nice to get back on the winning side of things before we head into the final stretch of region games," Union coach Casey Jones said.

The Panthers trailed 19-12 in the second quarter until a 10-0 run sent them into the break with a 22-19 advantage.

Leading 28-21 in the third, Andrews pulled within a point at 32-31 with 1:10 left in the period. Union, however, was able to pull away with an 18-1 run that put things out of reach at 50-32 with two minutes

"I told Coach (Kevin) Hughes, 'if we don't stretch this (lead) out pretty quick we're going to be in a fight at the end, Jones said. "Luckily we were able to make a few shots and push the lead on out." One day earlier, the Pan-

thers were roughed up 75-31 by 4th ranked Greater Atlanta Christian. Scorching hot from 3-point range in the first half, the Spartans sprinted out to a 29-8 lead after one and 50-15 at halftime.

Union County hosts North Hall and East Hall this week with an opportunity to put a stranglehold on fourth place in Region 7-AAA. Currently, GAC, Dawson, and East Hall have one loss apiece while the Panthers lead North Hall by one game in the win column after defeating the Trojans in Clermont

'They're going to be gunning for us because we beat them down there," Jones said. "They're playing pretty good right now and that's everyone's goal is to be playing well this time of the year.'

Union fell 77-61 at East Hall earlier this month but took the Vikings down to the wire in last year's meeting in Blairs-

faithful to its feet, sensing a shift in momentum that favored the home team. Consecutive baskets by Drake gave Union its first lead of the quarter at 20-19, then Can-

dler Colwell put the finishing touches on the half with a dribble drive to beat the horn, awarding the Panthers a three-point lead "It's nice to have Sawver (Drake) back," Jones said. "He


