Hospital Walk Throughs

Dealing with fires and emergencies can be difficult. There can be many factors and unknowns. Critical actions must take place in a short amount of time to control the chaos. Being prepared is key to dealing with these factors in any emergency. Being prepared requires knowledge, plans, and practice.

Last week Union County Fire Department conducted a walk-

through of Union General Hospital. The purpose of this walk through was to familiarize each shift with the building and the emergency systems. Being familiar with these systems will help firefighters respond if there was an

The firefighters were escorted through the hospital by James Bradley, Union General Hospital Maintenance and Cecil Solaguren, Environment of Care Director. We began with a view of the outside of the hospital to determine the best areas for apparatus placement. We discussed where to place apparatus and which areas were best for firefighters to enter the building. Inside the building, firefighters were shown the locations for the alarm panels, sprinkler systems, electricity shut off, the water

The power control plant was reviewed to familiarize firefighters with the systems used to control the things such as electrical power, backup power, heating, cooling, ventilation, and water for the hospital. These systems are complicated and can be extremely dangerous. Firefighters must be familiar with the various dangers and the procedures to shut these systems down in the event of a fire

The most important was the alarm panels and fire sprinkler systems. The panels were located and the procedure for operating each was reviewed. These panels can tell firefighters where the fire is most likely located; how large the fire may be; and if the sprinklers are activated. Having this information quickly will determine the procedures for the hospital personnel as well as firefighters re-

Firefighters also reviewed the fire sprinkler systems and how to operate each system. Firefighters must know how to determine if a sprinkler head has been activated and how to support that sprinkler with the fire engine. We must also know how to cut the water

The purpose of the Museum of the Bible, opened in 2017 in Washington D.C., is not just to display relics. It shows how the Bible has impacted human history, individual people, and every area of life.

The city levies and collects its own property taxes and receives a large portion of their income from water and sewer service. They also have their own police force and employees. A. Union County School System - The school government

is made up of five Board of Education members elected from certain voting districts in the county. The School Board members then appoint a School Superintendent to manage and operate the school system. The school system also has their own security team (Police Force). The Union County Tax Commissioner collects their property taxes on the combined tax bill you receive from the county. School taxes are sent directly to the school system. The school sets their own property tax rate based on their financial

A. Union County Government - The county government is completely separate from the school and the city government.

Crape Myrtle Pruning

Crape myrtles are a very common tree that many people like to plant in their home landscape or you may see them lining roads in towns. There are couple of reasons why crape myrtles make great landscape trees. The first is that they are very disease and insect resistant, there are not

too many pests that will bother them. Powdery mildew is the most serious disease issue that crape myrtles will usually have, and it rarely kills the tree.



Ambrosia beetles will attack crape myrtles, but generally they only attack trees that are already dead, dying, or stressed. Crape myrtles also come with a variety of flower colors, making them very attractive. Finally, crape myrtles come in a variety of sizes. Varieties range from dwarf to semi-dwarf to full size, meaning mature tree

heights range from 3 to 30 feet tall. Pruning is important for crape myrtles, because the blooms only form on new growth. Even more important is selecting the right sized variety for your location. If you select a variety that will grow to a good height for the spot where you're putting it, the pruning will not be difficult. because you won't be as concerned with manag-

Now is a good time of year to prune your crape myrtles. Excessive pruning can lead to problems with disease and insects, because the tree is stressed. Bad pruning practices are called CRAPE MURDER. Crape murder generally involves topping the tree, or cutting back all the branches to 3 to 4 feet above the ground. This will result in an oddly shaped tree that produces

To properly prune a crape myrtle start at the base of the tree and work your way up. You're looking for suckers, if you find them prune those off. Once you get to where the branches are, remove crossing branches. Crossing branches will rub against each other when the wind blows and create sites where disease and insects can get in. As the tree grows you can remove branches from the lower third of the tree. Removing those branches will expose the trunk character. Some people like to prune off the old seedheads. I think they're an attractive feature. With new growth in the spring the old seedheads will fall off. On some varieties of crape myrtles you can prune in the summer after the blooms are spent to create another flush of flowers. A second bloom is difficult to force on varieties that bloom after mid-

A common misconception is that crape myrtles have to be pruned to produce flowers. This is not true. Pruning allows to you shape the
