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Panthers secure 3-seed entering next week's region tourney

Union County locked up third place in Region 8-AA with weekend victories over Rabun County and Putnam County. Unfortunately, their pursuit of the top spot went out the window Tuesday night with a 54-49 loss to Social

Currently, the Panthers are two games back of second-place Banks County, who Union County hosts on Tuesday, but with two games to play, the best head coach Corey Garrett's squad can hope for is a tie, and Banks owns the tiebreaker over the Panthers. "I don't have a prefer-

ence (of who we draw in the first or second round)," Garrett said. "I don't really want to play anyone over someone else. I just want us to finish this final week strong. I feel like we're coming on at the right time, with the exception of Social Circle, where we couldn't get a layup to drop. But I feel like we're getting very close to playing our best basketball. We're getting there. We're close and we just can't let up.' Unfortunately, Union

County must play out the season without its leading 3-point marksman, Lake Hughes, who was lost to a broken arm vs Social Circle and could be sidelined for up to eight weeks.

Although, there is a little bit of good news. The opening round of both region tournaments will likely be hosted by Union County as the No. 3 seed on the girls' side was named the predetermined host before the season.

The location of the final two rounds has yet to be determined and will be settled during next Friday's Putnam County at Rabun County girls game, with the winner hosting the region semifinals, along with the consolation and title Just like the location of

the final two rounds, Union County's first-round opponent has yet to be determined. The likely candidates are Putnam County, Elbert County and Currently, fifth-place

Putnam leads sixth-place Elbert by one game and seventh-place Monticello by two. Putnam can guarantee itself at least a 5-seed by knocking off Elbert on Tuesday. That would leave the 6-seed (Union's opponent) in a two-way battle between Monticello and Elbert, who meet on Friday -- assuming Monticello defeats Oglethorpe County on Tuesday.

There is still a possibility that fourth-place Rabun County, who leads Putnam County by a game, could create further chaos by losing to both Social Circle and Putnam. When those two losses are combined with Elbert winning out, the prospects of a three-way tie for fourth

(Elbert, Putnam, Rabun) enter the picture.

To summarize: No. 3 Union and No. 8 Oglethorpe are the only locks. As for the other six, a few positions could be sewn up on Tuesday, but the full tournament slate won't be set in stone until late Friday night.

Banks and Social Circle still have eyes on first. Rabun, Putnam and Elbert are all in contention for fourth. Monticello is in seventh but could jump to fifth if the stars align.

Panthers 59, Putnam County 42 - Senior Sawyer Drake scored a game-high 19

points, including 11-straight in the second half, to lead Union County to the season-sweep of the War Eagles and secure the No. 3 seed in next week's Region 8-AA Tournament.

Trailing 12-9 at the halfway point of the first quarter, the Panthers stormed ahead with a 10-1 run and held a 19-17 lead after one. Senior point guard Pierson Allison led Union County with 8 points in the opening frame, all coming in the paint or at the foul line.

Allison began the second by driving inside for a bucket as the Panthers scored the first five points of the period. Still leading 24-21, Union County scored 10-unanswered to take a 34-23 advantage into the

spurt. Drake accounted for the final five Panther points of the frame, then scored his team's first six points of the fourth as Union built a 50-34 lead at the five-minute mark.

were tops on the team with two assists each as Allison, Drake and Rich dished out one dime

Allison, Morlock and Drake all recorded three steals, while Brey added one. Brey blocked two shots and Morlock sent back one.

The Panthers shot 45% from the floor and held Putnam to a dismal 28% shooting performance. Both teams struggled from distance, combining to sink just 8-of-37 (22%), with Union hitting 19% and Putnam making 24%.

Additionally, both teams In the third, the War were equally bad at the charity for 44% and Putnam hit 7-of-17 for 41%. The Panthers dominated the points in the paint battle 38-22 but finished even on the boards at 40 rebounds each. Putnam crashed the offensive glass (14-11) at a slightly higher clip and won 12-8 on second-chance

Union County held a narrow edge in the turnover battle at 19-15, but converted those miscues into 21 points. compared to just 10 points off turnovers for the War Eagles.

Panthers 74, Rabun County 47 - Union County extended its winning streak over the Wildcats to seven games behind 17 points apiece from Allison and Drake.

Things were tight after eight minutes but the Panthers turned it up in the second frame -- outscoring Rabun County 22-7 -- to take a 40-24 halftime lead. "Our 1-3-1 defense has

given (Rabun) fits, but other than that, I don't know why we've been successful (against Rabun) to be honest," Garrett said when asked what makes Union such a tough matchup for Rabun. "I do know that Sawyer

(Drake) and Pierson (Allison), for some reason, always play well against Rabun. Every time. But other than that, I can't really give you an an-

Allison led the first-half charge with a baker's dozen. Meanwhile, Drake wasn't far behind with 12 points and Morlock chipped in five. Union County opened

up a 49-27 advantage with a

answering with five-straight to trim the margin to 17 at the two-minute mark. The Panthers would quickly remove any hopes of a comeback as Morlock con-

verted an and-one and Drake knocked down a short jumper for a 54-32 advantage. Rabun County would

never threaten again as Union maintained a comfortable 20-point margin for the entire fourth quarter, despite resting its starters.

Twelve Panthers would score in the contest behind Allison and Drake's 17-point performances. Morlock had eight, Hemphill finished with seven, Cox and Kight added five each, Brey added four and

Lariscy scored three.

Through three quarters. Union County was 67% on 4-of-6 from long distance. They would finish 5-of-12 (42%) from three but shot a blistering 59% from the floor on 26-of-44. Rabun County was also

knocking down shots, hitting 56% on 19-for-34, despite making just 3-of-10 (30%) from downtown. At the line, the Wildcats were 6-of-13 for 46%, while Union made 17-of-28 for 61%. The Panthers won the

into the contest, Union County was in charge with a 24-17 lead at the 5:26 mark of the second quarter.

They would go on to muster only 25 points over the final 21-plus minutes.

Still on top 29-28 at the break, the Panthers were clinging to a narrow lead in the early stages of the third when Rich picked up his third foul with 5:28 on the clock. Moments later, the Redskins grabbed their first lead since the game's early stages.

But Union had an answer, as well. Trailing 34-33, Cox and Brey put Union back in front 37-34 with back-toback buckets.

All tied up at 37-37, Allison and Cox put the Panthers on top 41-39, but Social Circle answered in the final seconds 9-3 start to the third but the to even the score at 41 heading Wildcats refused to go away, into the fourth.

Cox's dribble-drive for two with 48 seconds left in the third would be the final Union County field goal until Drake drove to the basket with 2:35 remaining, pulling the Panthers within three at 47-44.

In fact, Union would go five minutes without a point until Drake split two free throws at the 3:48 mark to keep his team within one possession at 45-42.

It wasn't just the Panthers that couldn't convert in the fourth, Social Circle went more than three minutes without a point and four minutes without a field goal. Unfortunately, Union's scoring
