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No. 7 Panthers tame Colts, outmatched at No. 2 North Cobb

Union County can secure No. 2 seed in Region 7-AA this week

No. 7 Union County (17-4, 8-3) played in front of the home crowd for the first time in over a month last Tuesday, cruising to a 78-58 victory over Coahulla Creek behind Houston Henry's 29 points, seven rebounds and seven assists.

During Friday's 74-57 loss at No. 2 North Cobb Christian, the Panthers were the victims of a 16-2 first-half run followed by a 30-16 stretch to close the game. North Cobb's win puts

the Eagles just one win shy of clinching the No. 1 seed in next month's Region 7-AA tournament. Second-place Union County is one game up on Lakeview Fort-Oglethorpe (LFO) in the standings, however, the Panthers face an easier path the rest of the way as LFO still has contests remaining at North Cobb Christian and at fourth-place Coahulla Creek.

Union County hosts Murray County on Tuesday night before hitting the road to face Ringgold on Friday.

No. 7 Panthers 78, Coahulla Creek 58 - Union County, playing without junior starter Vince Marevka (illness), all but locked up a top-three seed in the region tournament via a blowout victory over thenthird-place Coahulla Creek on Tuesday, Jan. 21.

"Obviously I was worried going up against [Coahulla's size] without Vince," Union County head coach Corey Garrett said. "He's been huge for us all year, but Holden [Payne] and Ethan [Hogsed] stepped up and played one of their best games. It was definitely Ethan's best game of the year.'

The Panthers stormed ahead 14-4 and never looked back against a Coahulla Creek squad that enters the final week of January having lost seven of eight following an 11-2 start.

During Tuesday's win, Union County held a 17-11 edge after one and maintained its 6-point edge at 21-15 until

game-high 29 in the first half, hit two free throws and Young knocked down a triple, growing the lead to 26-15 with 5:45 left in the half. Later, a Young free throw and a Kaden Combs bucket handed the Panthers a 29-17 advantage.

Union preserved its 12-point margin into the break at 34-22, then put the game out of reach with a 12-0 run to start the third. The defense ignited the spurt when Henry's steal resulted in a Hayden Hughes layup. Two more Coahulla turnovers led to a Hughes free throw and a Payne trey.

Two more Hughes 3-pointers capped the run and opened up a 46-22 advantage with 4:25 left in the third.

Coahulla answered with 7-straight points until Henry, Combs and Hogsed accounted for their team's next 10 points, 2 North Cobb Christian 74 growing the lead to 56-31.

Another Hogsed trey to start the fourth expanded the margin to 59-33, and later, away by outscoring the visitors

ed Union its largest lead of the night at 67-39 with 4:41 to play.

Hogsed finished with a career-high 12 points on 3 of 6 from long range. Hughes had 11 points, three boards and two steals. Young went for 9 points, seven rebounds and three steals. Payne finished with 8 points, a rebound and a steal. Combs recorded a career-best six steals to go with 7 points, two rebounds and two assists. Hayden Price

Despite getting out-rebounded 39-21, Union County won the turnover margin 22-8 and outscored Coahulla 31-9 off turnovers. 'As our defense goes,

our offense goes," Garrett said. "Forcing 22 turnovers was huge, and we hit 13 threes, so that helped a lot.'

No. 7 Panthers 57, No. Union County was held under 60 points for the first time in 13 games and the Eagles pulled Henry, who scored 17 of his Combs' fast-break tip-in grant- 30-16 over the final 9+ minutes.

Henry and Marevka kept the Panthers within 10 inside of 5:30 but North Cobb's size was too much down the stretch, scoring via a tip-in and a layup on its next two possessions. The Eagles knocked down a 15-footer with 4:08 remaining, putting Union County in a 62

A North Cobb triple at the 2:15 mark, making it 69-51, put the game out of reach.

"We've shown that we can compete with them," Garrett said. "But [their size] always seems to creep in and get us at the worst time."

Hughes finished with 17 points on 5 of 13 from behind the arc. He added two boards and two steals in the loss. Young had 17 points, three rebounds Henry's night ended with



Union County (13-8, 6-6) picked up two doubledigit wins over No. 10 Coahulla Creek and at North Cobb Christian, heading into this week's showdowns vs. Class AA's No. 4 Murray County and at Region 7-AA's third-place

In the two wins last week, Union County held its opponents to 61 combined points - marking the third time this season the Lady Panthers held opponents under 35 points in consecutive games. However, unlike the previous two occasions, the latest came vs. a pair of teams with winning records

"I was really proud of our effort," Union County head coach Thomas Nelson said. "Having Katelyn Brown back has really helped us a lot defensively."

Lady Panthers 46, No. 10 Coahulla Creek 31 - Únion County closed on an 15-3 run during a low-scoring affair in Blairsville on Tuesday, Jan. 21.

Sophomore Regan Trlica led the way with 13 points, five steals, three rebounds and two assists. Ariel McCarter finished her night with 9 points, seven steals and five assists.

One of McCarter's steals sparked Union's late run, resulting in Trlica's fast-break layup to close the third with her team up 33-28.

A Colts' bucket with just under 6 minutes to play turned out to be their final points of the game, allowing Union to pull away down the stretch.

Senior Katelyn Brown and Trlica answered Coahulla scores, keeping the margin at five early in the fourth, then Trlica split two free throws before knocking down a baseline jumper that bumped the lead to 39-31 with 4:46 left.

Aubrie Akins' turnaround jumper and a Trlica free throw opened up a 42-31 lead, and then Hope Taylor followed with a bucket in the paint at the
