Lady Panthers close out regular season with back-to-back wins

Union earns opening round rematch with Dawson following victories over Lady Tigers and Lumpkin

The Lady Panthers capped off a perfect week with their first win at Dawson County in six years to set up a Tuesday rematch in this week's Region 7-AAA Tournament.

The Lady Panthers and Lady Tigers will square off on Tuesday at Greater Atlanta Christian Schools in Norcross. Tip-off is scheduled for 4:30

Last Tuesday, Union County stormed past Lumpkin 48-44 behind 16 second half points from junior Bailey Daniel. At Dawson County on Friday, she once again led the way with 15 points in a 53-46

Dawsonville - Going into Friday, the Lady Panthers hadn't defeated their former Region 8-AA rival Lady Tigers since the 2011-12 season. Meanwhile their last win in Dawsonville came one season prior (2010-11) with Head Coach Jim Hughes at the helm. However, since the Lady Tigers moved up to Class AAA prior to the 2012-13 season, Union County had dropped seven-straight in the series, including the 2012 Battle of the States Championship and most recently, a home court, blowout loss earlier this season.

But during the second meeting, the Lady Panthers made it clear that loss was in the rearview and they would not roll over and provide the Lady Tigers with an easy-W for Senior Night.

Union led throughout the opening quarter and much of the second before Dawson closed the first half on a 9-0 run for a 26-21 lead at the intermission.

On top 15-13 after one, the Lady Panthers led 21-17 before a Lady Tigers' lay-in at the 2:18 mark of the second was followed by two more field goals and a trey, sending Union into the break trailing by five. 32 to open the fourth, Dawson would misfire on a trey, but

A free throw from Fair 10, Dawson connected from cut the Lumpkin lead to one at 37-36 with 3:56 remaining. and following a missed-three on the other end, Daniel drove baseline, spun back into the paint and connected on the short jumper to put her team up for good.

On the ensuing possession, Lumpkin missed the front-end of a 1-and-1, and as Daniel raced the other way, she drove into the lane before kicking out to an open Fair, who sank the trey from the wing with 2:36 left.

Leading by four, Fair turned a Lumpkin turnover into a six-point Union lead. Still up by six, Daniel sank 2-of-2 at the line with 1:41 remaning to open up an eight-point advantage. She would later hit 1-of-2 to make it a nine-point game at the 1:11 mark.

Like the ladies, Union and Dawson split the regular season meetings and will settle things with a rubber match on Wednesday at East Hall. Early on at Dawson, the

Panthers led 9-6 on a basket by junior Crawford Colwell, then a trey from freshman Pierson Allison broke an 11-11 tie but the Tigers knocked down a free throw, and a minute later, went inside to even the score with a deuce.

Dawson stormed ahead in the second quarter with a 7-0 run before a jump hook by junior RJ Banton slowed the bleeding.

The Tigers led by as many as eight in the period on two different occasions but a steal by Allison led to a lay-in by junior Candler Colwell and a buzzer-beating lay-up from freshman Sawyer Drake, sandwiched around two Dawson free throws kept Union within six at the break,

A Crawford Colwell basket to open the third was answered by a Tiger lay-up and a trey on the other end.

Allison led Union with 14 points and 2 steals. Crawford Colwell had 12 points, 8 boards, 2 assists, and 2 steals. Baenninger added 11 points and 6 boards. Candler Colwell fin-

ished with 6 points and 6 rebounds. Banton had 4 points to go with 2 steals. Junior Cole Wright

After suffering a one-

sided loss in Dahlonega just 72 hours prior, it was Union's turn to welcome the Indians to town with fourth, fifth, and sixth place on the line in the
