Schakat and Wright will serve their country at West Point

Most schools would celebrate one student gaining acceptance into a service academy – Union County High School is sending two.

Seniors Emmi Schakat and Cole Wright are headed to the United States Military Academy at West Point after graduation, and earlier this month, the high school recognized both at a National Signing Day ceremony in the gymnasium.

"This is not only a real honor for these young people, but for the people who have helped Cole and Emmi get into West Point," said U.S. Army Col. Dan Wickersham, who attended Signing Day. "It's a task. They're going to the No. 1 leadership institution in the world, and I really look forward to seeing them up

there.'

While both of their journeys will culminate in the small Hudson River Valley town of West Point, New York, Schakat and Wright took separate paths to get there.

Wright drew interest from the Black Knight football program between his junior and senior years, and last summer, he visited the campus and immediately committed.

On Feb. 7, National Signing Day, he made it official.

"Coach Brent Davis (Army offensive coordinator) and I kept in contact almost weekly, and he has recently visited me at my house again," Wright said. "He has been awesome throughout my entire process and never once pressured me to commit. I can't wait to get up to New York and get to work.'

As for Schakat, she

happened upon West Point during her junior year, and like her fellow classmate, she immediately envisioned herself as a U.S. Army cadet.

"I was doing some research when I found West Point, and it was like a light bulb moment for me - that's what I need to do," she said. "I feel like there is a huge need for superior leadership, I wanted an adventure, and I wanted to make a positive difference. For me, West Point is the place to be for all of that.'

Also on hand for the signing ceremonies was Bill Kokaly, representing U.S. Rep. Doug Collins of Georgia's 9th Congressional District.

Kokaly is a veteran of the U.S. Air Force, and he took a moment to educate those in attendance on the value of a West Point education.

Two former students of Union County Schools survived the horrific Valentine's Day shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

A lone gunman murdered 17 people in the shooting

The former Union County students, who are sisters, appeared on several news outlets to tell their story, including WPTV NewsChannel 5 out of West Palm Beach, Florida.

"I heard people scream, 'Help me,'" said the 17-yearold student, identified by friends on Facebook as Mady. "I thought it was fake at first,


Veteran Bud Johnson recalls Battle of Iwo Jima

HIAWASSEE - On Feb. 16, 1945, a young Bud Johnson arrived offshore of Iwo Jima, Japan, aboard the USS Silverstein (DE-534).

Johnson had earned the rank of Chief Petty Officer Third Class several months prior on the Silverstein, and as Chief Quartermaster of the ship, he held the wheel for three straight days as the entire crew of the destroyer escort went to battle stations.

He and his fellow sailors in a fleet of more than 400 ships bombarded the island ahead of the Feb. 19 amphibious landing of the Fourth and Fifth Marine Divisions.

The Marines took Mount Suribachi on Feb. 23, 1945, four days after the ground assault began, and Johnson witnessed both U.S. flag raisings from his ship at Iwo Jima.

Nearly 7,000 Americans died during the Battle of Iwo Jima, which resulted in victory on March 26, 1945.

Seventy-three years later, on Feb. 16, 2018, Johnson demonstrated that he still had the ability to command the attention of those around him.

"I thank God and I thank my Jesus Christ that He gave me the years that He's given me," said Johnson, who will turn 96 on March 7. "I've been in this community for 45 years. I've been all over the world, and I would never live anywhere but in America, in

City and county commemorate Arbor Day with tree planting

The City of Blairsville teamed up with Union County Government, the Blairsville Garden Club and the Georgia Forestry Commission to celebrate Arbor Day on Friday, Feb. 16

Blairsville Mayor Jim Conley, Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris, Garden Club members and GFC Rangers Roy Fortenberry and Justin Davenport weathered the rain together at the Old Blairsville Cemetery to proclaim Feb. 16 Arbor Day.

Fortenberry presented the mayor, commissioner and garden club with a Tree City flag to recognize their continued support for maintaining and replenishing the greenery throughout the county. "We're so very excited

to celebrate our 24th year as a Tree City," said Lou Ann Bleakley, Blairsville Garden Club President. "It is an honor that we hope to continue."

To achieve the status of Tree City, the city must meet the Tree City USA program's four requirements of having a tree board or department, a tree care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and hold an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

Mayor Conley read an Arbor Day proclamation on behalf of both the city and Commissioner Paris that Friday

The proclamation read: "Trees and native plants are among our most valuable resources; trees provide a more livable environment for mankind, providing clean air and removing pollutants from the air.

"Trees provide a cooling effect and prevent global warming; trees are a source of food for man and animals: trees constitute hope for our future and carry out our heritage as they provide for a stable environment.

'Arbor Day is designated for tree planting, and the Garden Clubs of Georgia encourage the participation in tree planting. The Blairsville Garden Club recognizes that the third Friday in February is designated as Arbor Day in Georgia.

"A tree will be planted on Feb. 16, 2018, to commemorate the 146th anniversary of Arbor Day and the 24th year in Union County, in cooperation with the Georgia Forestry Commission, City of Blairsville, Blairsville Garden Club and the Union County Commissioner's Office.
