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our experiences with them are very, very numerous," said Dr. Rayfield. "When I first got here, one of the first faces that I would see in and out of the office here, offering to help us with most anything we had going on, was Ms. Leslie

Daniel. I consider her to be really a great school liaison, because if we say we need AED machines, she helps, she gets them for us.

'We've got a sports medicine program started and an athletic trainer because of a partnership that all these folks worked on and approved for our students to take part in."

The hospital has hosted special training for staff at all of the Union County Schools, including how to use automated defibrillators, how to do CPR, and lessons on how to stop various types of wounds from bleeding.

That training was conducted by Union General EMS Director Wesley Rogers, with assistance from Air Life Georgia and Northeast Georgia Medical Center.

"That's just a sampling of the things that they do," said Dr. Rayfield. "They do a tremendous amount of work throughout the school system and provide lots of services for our students and employees, and we're just

absolutely excited to recognize Union General Hospital as our community partner for this month.

Representatives from Union General Hospital, Inc. who accepted the award that evening were CEO Lewis Kelley, ČOO Michael Gay and Hospital Administrator Leslie Daniel.

Past recipients of the award include the Union County Government, UGA

Extension Office, Union County Sheriff's Office, the Union County Fire Department and Emergency Management Agency, and the North Georgia News.
