## **The Fire Apparatus**

Wherever I go, I am always looking for fire stations as all firefighters do. I am fascinated at the many different types and designs. Of all the different fire stations that are out there, one thing is for certain; there is a fire truck, or as we call them, fire apparatus, in each one of them. As people pass by the fire stations in Union County, they know that there is a fire apparatus in that station, but

do they really know anything about it? Each fire station must be certified by Georgia Firefighter Standards and Training Council (GFSTC) and one requirement of that certification is to have a fire apparatus at that station. GFSTC requires that there be an operable pumper or fire apparatus with



a capacity of 750 gallons per minute (gpm) at 150 psi and tank capacity of a minimum of 250 gallons. The fire apparatus in Union County well exceeds these minimums. Most have at least a 1,000 gpm pump and a water tank of 1,000 gallons.

That does not mean that on every fire that we pump 1,000 gallons of water per minute, but we have the capability to do so. Most fires require that we pump 150 to 300 gallons per minute. Each 1 ¾ inch attack line (fire hose and nozzle) used by the firefighters can flow 95 to 150 gallons per minute. Usually we use two or three of these lines on a fire. However, on major or large fires, we may use larger attack lines such as 2 1/2 inch lines which can flow almost 250 gallons per minute.

The fire apparatus also must carry a certain amount of firefighting and rescue equipment in order to be certified. There are the common things that people associate a fire apparatus to carry. These include fire hoses, nozzles, ladders, and axes but there is much more. Union County fire apparatus carry other equipment such as fire extinguishers; hand tools for forcible entry; power tools such as chain saws; various hose couplings to connect fire hose; salvage and overhaul equipment; turnout gear; and self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). Of course, a fire apparatus would not be an emergency vehicle without the red lights, siren and Federal Q siren.

The fire apparatus is the corner stone of the fire department. We have both new and older apparatus but regardless of their age, they are equipped, tested, maintained, and always ready to respond

## **Crisis of Contempt**

Dr. Arthur Brooks spoke at the 2020 National Prayer Breakfast in Washington D.C. His message was not well received by some, but it is a message we need to hear.

America is facing a crisis. Scorched earth politics, de-mands to "fundamentally change" our country, and violence against political opponents are symptoms. Dr. Brooks, a Harvard

professor, identified the problem as a crisis of contempt, defined as "the unsullied conviction of the worthlessness of another." How did we get there? Market-driven reporting and ill-informed opinions foment outrage, which triggers contempt, which erupts into the headlines of the day.

## **Commissioner's Questions**

Q. Thank you very much for giving us the weather updates this winter on your Facebook page. That has been a really big help. Will it be possible for us to look at the cameras on Neels Gap (Blood Mountain) during bad weather from our home computers or phones in the future?

A. We are working very closely with GDOT and our own

computer IT Department trying to find a solution. One problem is that with mission critical cameras, opening them up to the public also makes them susceptible to hacking. So what this may require is once we have our main cameras and the GDOT cameras set up and consistently operational,



we may be able to install a separate "Web Cam" with its own circuit so it will not negatively impact the main cameras.

#### Q. Why is it so difficult for the public to get access to the **GDOT camera on Neels Gap?**

A. The GDOT camera was not designed to accept the direct fiber connection that we had installed, but it was set up to work off the cell phone signals. Once we determined that the cell phone signal was not reliable in bad weather, we worked with Blue Ridge Mountain EMC to have the fiber cable run to the camera directly. Unfortunately, that was several months ago and GDOT has been unable to get their camera adjusted and set up for us to receive access. We are still working very hard to make this happen soon.

Q. Why is it so difficult to get a camera on the mountain set up so we can all see it? There are cameras that are viewable all over the world?

A. To just get a still shot from a camera is not very difficult, but to be able to see the actual movement of the video is more difficult. We must get a reliable video and then once that is done. hopefully we can then figure out how to make it available to the public through a website. Sometimes, if too many people try to access a camera via computer, the picture may not be good enough. If we share the photo/video, we want to have it as clear as possible because there is often fog on the mountain, and it can be difficult to see without additional data.

Q. The last time you showed a snow weather report on your Facebook page, it had a photo of Wolf Pen Gap on

## Chill Hours

This week I'm going to talk about chill hours and the affect that cold has on plants. The cold weather can feel very dreary and like there is no life with plants not growing, trees without leaves, and wildlife holing up for the winter. However, winter is a very important and necessarv time of the year UGA for plants. Without it there's a number Watching of important fruits and Working and flowers that would not bloom Jacob every year. Let's Williams talk about the effect that cold weather can have on plants and why it's so important. For some plants they are not just responding to the cold, but they are also responding to the change in day length as the days grow shorter in winter and then longer into the spring. These kinds of plants are called photosensitive, because they are responding to the changes in light. Mums and poinsettias are some common examples. A change in the day length can trigger blooming or other responses in these plants. Many fruit plants require chill hours to be able to put on blooms. Chill hours is a count of the number of hours where the temperature is less than 45 degrees Fahrenheit. After a satisfactory number of chilling hours has been reached, the plant will break into bloom. This chilling process is called vernalization. Without vernalization, we wouldn't be able to enjoy apples, peaches, tulips, foxgloves, blueberries, and many other plants. Different varieties of plants require different numbers of chilling hours, so it's always best to pick varieties that are well adapted to our climate so that you have the most success with your fruits and flowers. For example if you select a variety of apples that requires too many chill hours, the apple tree will not bloom. However, if you select a variety of apples that has a chill hour requirement that is too low, it could bloom too early, and the flowers would be killed in a frost. In these plants, a repressor gene is keeping the plants from blooming. The cold causes that repressor gene to be altered so that it's no longer controlling the blooming of the flower. That way when warmer temperatures arrive the flowers can bloom out. The timing of when cold happens is also critical. Oftentimes in the mountains, we'll have a late freeze after many of the apple trees have already bloomed. Freezing temperatures after bloom can result in flowers dying and falling off. If the blooms fall off a fruit tree, that tree won't be able to bear any fruit that year. For a freeze to damage blooms the temperature usually need to be 28 or lower. Early freezes can be damaging to plants as well. They are forced into freezing See Williams, page 5A

during the late 1940s and early 1950s. They ran with the likes of Tommy Trapp, William Shelnutt, Jerry Cohen and Hubert Brooks. These boys grew up and did everything together. They had a code and it was enforced. None of the boys ever told on another one of the boys. You might not agree with what one of the boys was doing, but, you never told on your buddy.

One day during church, the boys were all sitting together, and Paul (my father) noticed that Tommy Trapp had something in his pockets that was causing them to bulge. When asked about the contents of his pockets, Tommy pulled out a big nail and whispered, "I am getting even with Old Man Newell." After church, the gang of boys walked outside to Old Man Newell's log truck. Tommy walked around the front of the log truck and emptied his pockets of the nails. There must've been 2 pounds of 16 penny nails in front of the wheels of that truck.

Paul and his younger brother Bud felt sorry for Old Man Newell, so, after Tommy and the other boys left, they began trying to kick the nails away from the front of the truck. At this point in time, Old Man Newell came up and thought the boys had placed the nails in front of his wheels. The old man had a fit and screamed out, "You boys are trying to give me a flat tire." Papa ran up to the boys and whipped them in front of the whole crowd. Paul and Bud would not tell on their buddies. So, they took the whipping without a word. But, they vowed to take vengeance on Old Man Newell.

Some years later, Old Man Newell's logging truck broke down, and the old man was relegated to driving his little buggy back and forth to town. A plan was soon hatched among the boys.
