## Soccer: No. 3 Union allows two late goals in 2-1 loss at No. 2 Providence

Lady Panthers force 2-2 draw vs. Gilmer, blanked 1-0 at Providence


Playing without its injured senior goalkeeper Trent Baker, the third-ranked Union County men surrendered two second-half goals in a 2-1 loss at second-ranked Providence on Friday, March 10.

Earlier in the week, Union County cruised past Gilmer in a 4-1 home victory on Tuesday, March 7. Meanwhile, the Lady Panthers, down three starters, dropped a 1-0 heartbreaker at Providence to stumble to 0-2 in Region 8-AA, putting Union in jeopardy of missing the postseason for the first time since 2018. The shorthanded Lady Panthers turned in a heroic effort on Tuesday, forcing a 2-2 tie vs. Gilmer via Lara Turner's late equalizer and an 80th-minute penalty kick denial from backup keeper Avary Smith-Foot.

Lady Panthers 2, Gilmer 2 - Turner knotted the score in the 70th minute, but Union County couldn't convert a pair of corner kicks in the 72nd before missing three shots over the last four minutes.

During the 80th, Gilmer broke into the open field in a 1-on-1 situation, drawing a hand-ball penalty on Union County inside the box. With 40 seconds remaining and the Bobcats a penalty kick away from moving ahead, Smith-Foot deflected the ensuing PK off her right leg, allowing the Lady Panthers to preserve the draw.

Gilmer broke a scoreless tie in the 17th minute after Union missed wide on a free kick in the seventh. Following two Smith-Foot saves, Turner missed wide in the 15th, and senior Italia Salazar's header was unsuccess-

ful a minute later.

The Lady Panthers couldn't convert a corner kick in the 29th, but Turner put back a miss to even the score in the 35th minute.

Twenty seconds into the second half, Gilmer inched ahead 2-1 -- a score they held for the next 30 minutes. Helton, Salazar and Turner all misfired on potential equalizers, then Union misfired on three shots during the 59th and 60th.

Smith-Foot turned away two Bobcat kicks in the 19th and 13th minutes, respectively, keeping her team within a goal.

The Lady Panthers, who out-shot Gilmer 20-9, are still missing a handful of key players -- most notably, Ariel McCarter, Kyra McKechnie and Addison

Walker's open-goal shot sailed high early in the second half and Gilmer answered moments later to narrow the gap to 3-1 in the 46th minute. With his team up 4-1 late in the game, Baker denied the Bobcats' final scoring opportunity with a freekick save in the 76th.

Union County out-shot Gilmer 24-6 and finished with seven corner kicks, compared to zero for the visitors.

## Baseball: Gilmer takes two from Union; Region 8-AA action starts Tuesday

Union County dropped both meetings of a home-andhome matchup vs. Gilmer, losing an 11-4 contest in Ellijay on Tuesday, March 7, followed by an 11-0 home loss on Friday.

The Panthers open Region 8-AA action this week against Class AA's secondranked Fellowship Christian. Union travels to Fellowship on Tuesday at 4:30 p.m. before hosting the Paladins in a Friday doubleheader at 4 p.m.

Panthers 4, Gilmer 11 - Union scored one in the first, but Gilmer answered with 10 unanswered runs, including six in the bottom of the third, to take a 10-1 lead into the fifth.

Union added a run in the fifth inning and two in the seventh. The Bobcats tacked on one in the sixth.

Sophomore Kaden Combs went 3 for 4 with 2 RBIs, while fellow 10th-grader Hayden Hughes knocked in one during a 2-for-3 day.

Freshman left-hander Maddox Patton tossed two innings in the start, allowing four hits, four earned runs and three walks. Senior Hunter Fleming yielded five hits and five earned runs in 1/3 of an inning; freshman southpaw Gunnar Akins went 1 2/3, allowing four hits, two walks and one run.
