until April 8th. Our recommendation is to hold onto your recyclables until the stations reopen if you are unable to take them to the Transfer Station.

Q. I know people are utilizing the park and the playgrounds. Is the county doing any type of sanitizing or disinfecting of the playground equipment?

A. Yes, the playground equipment was sanitized by a cleaning service. Elite Cleaning Services did this as a gift to our county and did not charge us. We would like to thank them and let them know how much we appreciate their kindness. We also would encourage anyone that may be considering us-

ing the equipment to bring their own disinfectant if you feel it is necessary.

Q. What can I do to help prevent the spread of Coronavirus?

A. These are the guidelines or best practices that are being given to us by the CDC: 1. Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after touching frequently used items or surfaces; 2. Avoid touching your face; 3. Sneeze or cough into a tissue or into your elbow; 4. Disinfect frequently used items and surfaces as much as possible. house and lived out their days on this location. The grave yard which was previously mentioned contains the graves of the couple. John died at the age of 63 in the year 1843, while Sarah died at the age of 71 in

1855. The first owner of the farm who actually has a recorded deed of the property in the Union County Courthouse is John Gordon Butt, a grandson of John. The house and farm was passed to his three sons, who sold it to their uncle, Eugene W. Butt. He served in the Confederate Army from the time he was 16 until the age of 21. After the war he was a merchant, farmer, banker, state legislator and county Ordinary. He also increased the size of the farm to 1,050 acres. This fellow also rebuilt and enlarged the house on the farm. One of his daughters was Cora Butt Wellborn, who is still fondly remem-

bered in Blairsville.

Alma Butt Fite purchased the farm from her father, Eugene, in 1920 and lost it in foreclosure in 1931. During 1934, the mortgage holder sold the farm to Marie Erwin Chandler. Her parents were Dr. Franklin

Jewel Elwin and Alice England, both of which were from Blairsville. Marie and her husband, Sidney G. Chandler, lived on the farm until 1939, when they moved to Athens. The Chandlers installed electricity and plumbing, and a damaged portion of the porch was removed which allowed more light into the home. Two of the early outbuildings, a garage and well house are still standing. An old log barn collapsed during the blizzard of 1993. At one time, there was also a smokehouse and woodshed.

The family dates the original structure back to 1840, making the Chandler House one of the oldest structures in Union County. The original house had two rooms upstairs and two rooms downstairs, with breezeways separating them. The kitchen was located in the back of the house. The interior walls of the house are of pine and they are held in place with square-cut nails. I wish that walls could talk. But, they cannot, so we are thankful that someone of the caliber of Marion and David Lifsey provided the information above for this

Title V: Credit Farmers are typically land rich, but cash poor, so credit has long been an essential part of the agricultural enterprise. Often though, because of the cyclical nature of farm businesses, that credit is too risky for private commercial lending. The Farm Credit Service was created in 1916. It was later known as the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) and was consolidated into one of the functions of the Farm Service Agency (FSA). FSA offers direct loans and also guarantees loans with partner banks and farm credit institutions to farmers.

These loan programs are funded through annual appropriations. The authorities, along with the Title VI rural development authorities, were only first included in a farm bill in the 1990s. In the 2014 Farm Bill, new provisions were included to help Beginning Farmers and Ranchers.

Title VI: Rural Development This title uses many of the same authorities as the credit title, but supports rural business and community programs, including rural electric and telecommunications services, rural water, and sewer infrastructure, rural hospitals and health care, among other programs.

because there is more runoff. Creating a channel that allows water to flow out of your yard helps with drainage.

In situations that have a mixture of these four factors it will be very challenging to grow grass instead of moss. Ferrous sulfate can be used to kill moss, but if the environmental conditions aren't changed, the moss will only return. The same thing goes for scraping moss off.
