NASCAR Racing Resumes May 9

NASCAR has suspended its season until the Martinsville race weekend of May 9-10. The decision came after conference calls between the sanctioning body and its team owners. It affects seven total races.

'We intend to hold all 36 races this season, with future rescheduling soon to be determined as we continue to monitor this situation closely with public health officials and medical experts," NASCAR President Steve Phelps said. "What is important now transcends the world of sports and our focus is on everyone's safety and well-being as we navigate this challenging time together.

"The health and safety of our fans, industry and the communities in which we race is our most important priority.'

The expanded postponement now includes race weekends at Texas Motor Speedway, Bristol Motor Speedway, Richmond Raceway, Talladega Superspeedway and Dover International Speedway.

NASCAR first said it would run last weekend and this coming weekend without spectators, but reversed course and postponed the races at Atlanta Motor Speedway and Homestead-Miami Speedway.

Phelps said that series officials are looking "broadly at what our options are" but intend to run every points race and the All-Star race this season and are planning to reschedule postponed races before the playoffs so the season can end as scheduled at Phoenix Raceway.

During a teleconference, Phelps said there is the possibility of races being run without fans. He noted that many questions remain in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and such decisions will be based on what health experts that NASCAR consult with suggest.

Phelps later said that he hoped not to have doubleheaders during the playoffs at tracks that have had races postponed (Bristol, Texas, Martinsville and Talladega).

As for racing without fans, Phelps said: "Would we consider racing without fans at some point to get back racing more quickly? That's in the consideration set. I don't know. It's changing so rapidly and what it means for mass gatherings and what is that number. We'll work with our health officials and we're working with a number of infectious disease professionals that are going to help us through what that looks like and whether it makes sense to race without fans or have our first race be back SHOULD MIDWEEK

to mention that of the Xfinity and Truck Series slates, are very limited. And when it is considered that one of those open weekends coincides with the Easter holiday, the number of openings on the racing calendar is even further reduced.

One potential solution to this scheduling difficulty could be that of racing midweek in prime time at some point during the 2020 season. This is an idea that has been kicked around for some time now but has not really been acted upon as some of the stake holders involved (tracks and teams in particular) may be leery of holding a race on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday evening.

Obviously, these would have to largely be made-for-television affairs as the number of fans able to attend will, in all likelihood, be limited to those who live and work within a tight radius of the track itself. But when it is considered that much of the revenue for the sport now comes from television, this would open a whole new set of possibilities as the broadcast networks could fill time in the midweek when there might not be nearly as many live sports options to compete against. While tracks want to fill as many of their seats as possible, their main source of revenue is from television. With or without fans, the tracks are going to turn a profit.

Indications are that there will be significant schedule changes for the Cup Series in 2021 and we have already been given some insight into that with the condensing of Daytona's SpeedWeeks next February. The use of midweek races could allow the sanctioning body to get in as many races as possibly while still reducing the amount of calendar used

This scheduling situation we are now in has presented NASCAR with an opportunity to try some things within their schedule during this 2020 season that might serve as a preview for upcoming years. This might prove to be an opportunity to turn what looked like potential disaster into prosperity.

NASCAR officials simply had no choice but to curtail their 36-race schedule until the national emergency we are facing can be contained. With so many professional sports and public venues bringing their respective plans to a temporary standstill, the most important course of action is to insure everyone is safe while the virus is being eradicated in the coming weeks and months. It means sheltering in place whenever possible and avoiding contact with others until the virus has been de-

The larger well-funded NA-SCAR teams will no doubt keep their employees working over the next six weeks by preparing race cars and maintaining equipment. Some of the smaller teams that operate on week to week sponsorship may have to close their doors for a while until


