State approves Chief Dyer as EMA director

There's a new EMA director in town, and his name is David Dyer.

This latest title makes Dyer a triple threat to any emergency, because alongside his position as EMA director, he's also the Union County Fire Chief and 911 Director.

'Being all under one umbrella, you can coordinate everything better – you know what's going on," said Chief Dyer. "It's a lot of work, but I like being busy.

"It's a big responsibility, and there's no way I could do it without this great crew that we have here in Union County. Everybody's got a part, and I'm just trying to be the coordinator."

Homer Bryson approved

Dyer's appointment as Union County EMA director effective Feb. 24, after receiving a recommendation on Dyer's behalf from Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris.

Bryson is the director for the Georgia Emergency Management Agency known as GEMA Homeland

Security. "The day-to-day emergency management operational responsibilities are extremely important, since it reflects the organization's capability to effectively respond to an emergency or disaster situation," wrote Bryson in a letter to Dyer. "As director of emergency management, it is your responsibility to ensure Union County's readiness to meet any emergency or disaster.'

Chief Dyer is a Union County native who attended Union County Schools before becoming both EMT and paramedic certified at Lanier Technical College in the early 1990s. He also has degrees in fire administration and business administration.

He worked with Union General EMS for 25 years, working his way up from EMT to paramedic, then to EMS captain and finally EMS director.

Chief Dyer has also taught a variety of medical courses for Union General and North Georgia Technical College, and was a flight medic for Rescue Air and Omni Flight for five years.

Through it all, Chief Dyer has been involved with the Union County Fire Department, serving as a

firefighter, a lieutenant, a captain, a battalion chief and ultimately as fire chief.

He assumed the role of fire chief when Charles Worden retired from that position in 2014. At the same time, Dyer became an EMA deputy director under Worden, who continued to work as EMA and 911 director until his retirement last month.

When Worden retired, Chief Dyer took over as 911 director and began to serve as interim EMA director pending approval from the state, which came last month.

For the past few years, the chief has been hard at work training in the EMA arena, and he has already completed his Advanced Georgia Emergency Manager certification.
