## West Hall, RGN and Putnam are the latest victims of Panther winning streak Eight straight wins has Union at 9-8 overall and two games out of first in 8-AA

Union County ran its winning streak to eight games last week following victories over West Hall, Rabun Gap-Nacoochee and a Friday night sweep of Putnam County in a Region 8-AA doubleheader.

Combined with Social Circle's sweep of first-place Banks County, the Panthers (9-8, 6-4) move to within two games of the region's top spot as Elbert County, Banks and Social Circle all sit atop Region 8-AA with two losses


Entering the week, Union County was all alone in fourth place, one game up on fifth place Rabun County. Both the Panthers and Wildcats took care of business in their respective doubleheaders with Rabun taking two from Oglethorpe County and Union downing Putnam, 10-0 in game one and 7-1 in game two, to preserve its one-game cushion over fifth.

The Panthers' eighthstraight victory is the longest winning streak in five years, matching the program's lengthiest winning streak of the decade. Union County last tallied eight straight between March 20 and April 4, 2014. According to UCHS Principal and former baseball coach CT Hussion, if the baseball program ever recorded ninestraight victories, it's been more than 20 years since it last happened.
"I think the six-run

rally in the seventh against Monticello (March 15) was what sparked (the winning streak) and got us over the hump," Union County Head Baseball Coach Zach Odom said. "We had seven hits in that inning and it woke us up and proved to us what we're

The Panthers toughest test of the week, however, came on Wednesday, March 27 when they hosted the Eagles of Rabun Gap-Nacoochee. Trailing 5-3 entering the seventh, Union County rallied for three runs with the third scoring when senior Jonathan Everett was hit by a 2-2 pitch with two down and

the bases loaded. Panthers 6, Rabun Gap 5 - Union County was playing catch-up most of the night until a walk-off hit-bypitch provided the Panthers with their first and only lead of the game in the bottom of the seventh inning.

the board in the bottom half of the inning. A two-run, two-out single by sophomore was 2-for-2 with a double, a four. Zeke Swartz brought home Issak Mullinak and Alec Scott, who both reached on an error earlier in the inning.

Sophomore JJ Littles made his varsity pitching debut and kept the Eagles off the board in the sixth despite giving up a two-out double. Trailing 4-2, the Panthers inched closer in their half of the sixth when senior Hunter Kelley was hit by a pitch and later scored on a Littles sacrifice fly.

A two-out throwing error in the seventh allowed Rabun Gap to tack on an insurance run but Littles brought the inning to a close when he caught the Eagle hitter looking at a 3-2 strike.

Needing two runs to tie and three to win, the Panthers immediately went to work in the bottom of the seventh, putting runners at second and third on back-to-back singles by Mullinak and Scott to open the inning.

Swartz reached on a grounder to load the bases when Mullinak returned to safely third after Rabun Gap tried throwing him out at the plate. Mullinak was eventually cut down at the plate for the first out when junior Cayden Rich bounced back to the mound. With the bags still full, Kelley scored Scott with an opposite-field single to left, pulling Union within a run at 5-4. Junior catcher Alec Youngblood brought home the tying run when he drew a five-pitch walk.

Senior left-hander Ean Harkins got the start and allowed 4 hits, 3 earned runs and 2 walks in three innings of work. Harkins was replaced by senior Coleson Daniel, who walked four over two innings while giving up one hit and one earned. Littles picked up the win after tossing the final two innings, surrendering 2 hits, one unearned run and recording one strikeout.

Panthers 10, Putnam County 0 (GM 1) - Union County ended the game via the "mercy rule" with two runs in the bottom half of the sixth to open up a 10-0

Mullinak was efficient while going the distance for the Panthers. The sophomore right-hander allowed 6 hits and one walk to go with 7 Ks during an economical 69pitch outing. At the dish, Mullinak scored three times and knocked in one while turning in a 3-for-4 performance.

Cayden Rich finished 3-for-3 with 3 RBIs, including a two-run single in the sixth that ended things at 10-0. Austin Garrison and Scott had two hits apiece for Union County with Scott doubling twice and driving in a pair. Swartz also scored and knocked in two during a 1-for-3 day at the plate.

Mullinak remained redhot going 2-for-2 with 3 RBIs, two walks, and a stolen base. He wrapped up the twin bill a combined 5-for-6 with 4 RBIs. Daniel finished 3-for-3 with 2 runs and a steal; Garrison scored three times and stole a base during a 2-for-3 performance while Scott was 2-for-5 with 2 RBIs and a

A leadoff error allowed Putnam to take a 1-0 lead in the second but Mullinak tied the game when he scored Garrison on a sacrifice fly in the Union half of the inning. Mullinak walked and later scored in the fourth on a throwing error. He brought

overall but own a pair of victories over a common opponent in West Hall. White County defeated West Hall 5-4 and 10-0 while Union won a pair of one-run games vs the Spartans.

"We only have the one game this week during Spring Break and we want the guys to just take it easy this week," Odom said after Friday night's doubleheader. "They've been busting their tails for a couple months so we'll give them a few days off. We'll come back for three or four days (prior to Thursday's game), then give them a few more days off at the end of Spring Break."

Notes: At 9-8 on the year, the Panthers' winning percentage is above .500 for the first time this season.

Coach Odom was correct in naming the Monticello rally as the turning point of the season. Dating back to the Monticello doubleheader on March 15, Union County is hitting a sweltering .361 with a .875 OPS. Over the same time span, the Panthers' walks and hit-by-pitches outnumber their strikeouts 45-to-38.

Prior to the Monticello series. Union was the victim of 81 strikeouts to only 41 BB/HBP. Hits were also at a premium as they struggled to generate offense with a .170 batting average and a .466

The pitching has also shown improvement as the Panthers posted a team ERA of 2.85 prior to Monticello. Since then, the pitching staff has been cruising along at a 1.47 clip.

ested citizens are encouraged to review proposed hunting regulation changes relative to the 2019-2020 and the 2020-2021 hunting seasons, and then make plans to offer comment at one of three scheduled public hearings, or through other available methods.

Proposed changes include amendments to reflect statutory changes, shift the Central Georgia bear season, adjust either sex firearms days for deer, extend archery season for urban counties that meet criteria, regulate hunting and other activities on wildlife management areas and other public lands, and some housekeeping changes.
