Life of a Firefighter

As we move into April, we are anxiously awaiting the promise of warmer weather that spring brings. The warmer weather means working in the yard, vacations, and enjoying the outdoors. For the fire department, it means more emergencies and more responsibilities. Spring is the time of year where we start some of our annual activities, namely testing of fire hose and inspecting of fire hydrants. These activities will continue through Fire Dept.

the summer until they are completed. Every fire hose of Union Coun-

ty Fire Department is tested annually. There are over 28,000 feet of fire hose. That's over five miles of hose. We have hose size ranging from 3 ½ supply lines to 1 ½ hand lines. Each 50

Fire Chief Dyer feet section of hose is tested by removing it from the fire apparatus, attaching it to the testing machine, and pressurizing that hose for a certain amount of time. The pressure is increase 2-3 times the amount of pressure used on a fire. During the test and immediately

after, the fire hose is inspected to determine if there are any leaks and if the couplings are secure. Once tested, the hose is marked, recorded and placed back on the fire apparatus. It is a labor intensive and time-consuming job. When all the fire hose is tested, the firefighters begin hydrant inspections. There are over 1000 fire hydrants and they are spread out throughout Union County and the City of Blairsville. UCFD firefighters inspect each one annually. The hydrants must be located and new hydrants are GPS recorded. Once located, the hydrant

is inspected for damage and operation. The caps are removed and

the hydrant is opened to ensure that it is operational and if there is

water at that location. There are times where the caps are greased to ensure they are easy to remove. Hydrant inspections can also be time consuming and it will take most of the summer and well into the fall to complete the inspections. Fire hose testing and hydrant inspections are just a couple of the many maintenance duties that Union County Fire Department firefighters perform. Most of these duties help to lower the county's ISO rating thus reducing fire insurance rates for home and

Q. We were coming back from the Union County Transfer Station today and there is new signage and blinking lights on either side of Deep South Farm Road directly across from Union General Hospital. Could you tell me what this is for? A. This is a new pedestrian crosswalk from the doctors' of-

fice, across Deep South Farm Road to the Hospital. When someone comes up and presses the button Q & A on the crosswalk light, there will be flashing lights in both directions. By Georgia Law you MUST stop if Commissioner anyone is in the crosswalk. The light lets you know that someone is about Paris to cross or may have just crossed, but you must slow down and anyone

A. Always use caution at any crosswalk, but if the light is flashing you must stop. If the light is not flashing, you do not have to stop unless it is obvious that someone is walking in the crosswalk. Once it is obvious that the people are across the highway and no one else is coming, you may continue. The pedestrian has the right of way, not the vehicle.

Q. Is the county still working on having property owners of distressed properties clean up?

A. Yes, Building Inspection and Development has been working very hard on this. Currently, they are working on thirty-eight different complaints regarding distressed properties and getting them cleaned up. As of today, Friday, March 30, sixteen of these complaints have been resolved and are closed. Most property owners who have received notice have already begun the cleanup process or are working with Building Inspection and Development to get the issue resolved.

 $\hat{f Q}$. I reported a house for having trash piled up last week and it has still not been cleaned up. Why?

A. When the County contacts people to clean up their property they must be given 30 days-notice once the letter is received. Sometimes there are circumstances that delay the cleanup process.

Our wildfire education programs are working because it was reported recently that a couple of our adjacent north Georgia counties had 134 wildfires (no Firewise) in the past 3 years and Towns has had only 9. The trend is holding true this year also! Might be luck, but we'll let our Firewise programs take the credit for educating you as to the dangers all around us and you have taken measures to lessen

The wildfire that we can have one day might not be as spectacular as the destructive fires out west, but if it is just your house or my house it is a tragedy just the same. The most dangerous months for wildfires up here in the mountains historically are November, March, and April, but we can't let our guard down the rest of the year because wildfires don't know which month it is and can happen at any time when the conditions are right. Wildfire education is a never ending, year round process.

Join communities throughout the U.S. on Saturday, May 5, 2018 as the National Fire Protection Association launches its fourth national Wildfire Community Preparedness Day! Dedicate a couple of hours for risk reduction, or the entire day, and watch as your actions positively contribute to reducing your community's wildfire risk.
