Union County's Ava Hunter just completed one of most impressive freshman seasons in the history of Lady Panther basketball, drawing the attention of media from across

Kyle Sandy of sandysspeil.com is one of the most respected high school basketball bloggers in Georgia and last month he released his 2018-19 award winners with Hunter among his selections as Class AA's Freshman of the Year.

With the ability to put the ball on the floor, break the press, beat defenders off the dribble and knock down outside jumpers, the 6-foot freshman isn't your typical post player. With the reputation as a workaholic and a gym rat, Hunter is constantly developing her skills, looking to add to an offensive arsenal that already includes a near-unstoppable drop step and jump hook.

When the dust settled on the 2018-19 season, Hunter finished as the team-leader in scoring at 14.1 points-per-game (353) points). She also led the squad with 1.4 (36) steals-a-game and 1.1 (27) blocks.

Her seven (176) reboundsper were second to Kait McCarter's 7.7 RPG. Hunter was also second in field goal percentage to McCarter (.523), connecting

Hunter also shot .596 (102-171) from the charity stripe, good enough for third best on the team behind Mc-Carter (.600) and Andelin Hill (.767). Hunter would finish at the top in both field goals made and free throws made.

The impressive numbers came as no surprise to anyone after Hunter's rookie season showed promise immediately, starting with 16 points and 4 rebounds vs Rabun Gap in the opener. In game two, she went for 24 and 9 vs Towns, followed by a 20-point, six-steal performance in a narrow victory at Fannin County.

She went on to make an instant impact in Region 8-AA action with a 16-point, 12-board double-double in her region debut at Elbert County, moving her Lady Panthers to 5-0 on

Following a solid 10and-8 stat line in a loss to Monticello, Hunter and Union County bounced back with a victory at Towns County where the freshman hit 7-of-8 from the floor and 5-of-8 at the line during a 19point, 12-board double-double.

Ten days later in Union County's return to TCHS, Hunter poured in 17-and-8 to hand Hokes Bluff, Alabama its first opening round loss in five years at the Battle of the States. After closing out the

She would close out the regular season with 13-6 in a come-from-behind win at Banks and 11-5 during a rout of Oglethorpe County that saw the starters rest most of the second half.
