Panthers sweep Rabun County, will open State tourney at Bremen

Union County ends regular season at 10-4 in region play after starting 0-4

A two-run, two-out double by senior Ean Harkins in the bottom of the sixth inning powered the Union County Panthers (14-10, 10-4) past Rabun County in game one of last Thursday's 8-AA doubleheader.

Union's late rally propeled them to an 8-1 game two victory, capping off the two-game, Senior Night sweep of the Wildcats and closing the 2019 regular season with 10 consecutive region vic-"I think these guys are


trying to see how fast they can give me gray hairs," joked Union County Head Baseball Coach Zach Odom regarding his team's penchant for late inning, two-out drama. "But really, I don't know. I think they just like the adversity and thriving in big moments. But I'm proud of them and they've been doing it all year so why change now?

The Panthers wrap up the regular season tied for third in Region 8-AA but will enter the state playoffs as the region's No. 4 seed after Social Circle won the region title and Elbert took second.

Previously, Banks County was atop 8-ÅA until Elbert County took two games from the Leopards on Saturday, dropping Banks into a third-place tie with Union County. Unfortunately, a struggling-at-the-time Panther squad was swept in Homer on March 1 -- the sixth and final loss of an 0-6 start to the season -- awarding the Leopards the

As a result, Union will travel to 3rd ranked Bremen -- the 5-AA Region Champions -- for a Wednesday doubleheader beginning at 4:30 p.m. Thursday's "if necessary" game in the best-of-three series will begin at 5:30.

Last week's regular-season finale, however, was expected to carry playoff implications. Instead, Rabun County limped into Blairsville, three games out of fourth and mathematically eliminated from the postseason. But that didn't matter once the teams hit the field. With Union County looking to improve its playoff positioning and the Wildcats playing for pride and bragging rights, game one provided another instant classic in a rivalry that settled the Region 8-AA title in 2015 and 2016.

Prior to his late-inning heroics vs Rabun County, Harkins, who's remained steady on the mound, was in the midst of a season-long slump at the dish that limited him to just two hits and one RBI in 39 plate appear-

Coach Odom, however, never lost faith in Harkins, and as a result, the 40th time was the

"He got off to a slow start this year and I don't think he was ever able to get comfortable with himself so he started to press,' Odom said. "He's been working hard and we've been giving him opportunities during the mid-week (games) but he finally came through. Everything he's been working for paid off and he deserves it.'

Meanwhile, sophomore Isaak Mullanack worked a complete game, two-hitter for the Panthers, striking out four while not allowing a walk. Although, Mullanack did hit three batters, including the leadoff man which allowed Rabun to grab an Harkins stepping to the plate. early 1-0 lead. A solo homer by Brody Jarrard to leadoff the fourth pushed the Wildcat advantage to 2-0, while Grayson Carver, Mullanack's counterpart, took a threehit shutout into the fifth.

The Panthers' luck began to turn when they escaped the fifth thanks to an unassisted double play following a one-out error. With the runner at first on the move, Mullanack snagged a soft, off-the-end-of-the-bat blooper on

the first-base side of the mound and then won the foot-race back to the bag to double-up the Wildcats fifth before Harkins delivered his go-ahead double in the sixth.

would battle his way aboard on a seven-pitch walk with one down in the fifth. Once again, the baseball gods smiled on Union County when Mullanack grounded out to shortstop, but with the hit-andrun on, Everett was able to reach second safely with two down, allowing them to get on the board when Alec Scott smacked a base hit back up the middle to cut the Rabun lead in half at 2-1.

Mullanack got out of trouble in the sixth after plunking Gunnar Stockton with a 2-2 breaking ball to open the inning. A stolen base and a sacrifice fly advanced the runner to third with two outs but a bouncer to senior third baseman Coleson Daniel kept Rabun off the board.

Senior Hunter Kelley doubled to leadoff the Union half of the sixth but consecutive ground outs put the Panthers in danger of leaving the tying run at second. A hard hit single to left by Austin Garrison put runners at the corners when Coach Odom held up Kelley at third with two down and

With the go-ahead run on first, Harkins lined a 0-1 pitch over the head of the Rabun centerfielder, bringing both runners around to score.

Leading 3-2 and the bottom of the Rabun order due up in the seventh, Mullanack surrendered iust his second hit of the day -- a two-out single to Kasin Old. Moments later, after falling behind 2-1 to the No. 9 hitter, Mullanack induced a slow roller to short that

Sophomore Zeke Swartz yielded just one hit and one unearned run over six innings during an efficient 62-pitch outing. The southpaw fanned four Wildcats and didn't walk a batter while throwing 47 of 62 pitches

Alec Youngblood and Mullanack each turned in a two-hit performance for the home team and Kelley drove in a pair as the Panthers pulled away late in an 8-1 victory.

A caught-stealing ended the Union County threat in the first but the second inning saw

the Panthers grab an early lead. A one-out double by Daniel was followed by a run-scoring single from Youngblood.

They would load the bases

when Garrison was hit by a pitch and Harkins was walked but Rabun got out of trouble on a 6-4-3, inning-ending double play, despite a questionable call at first when Everett appeared to beat the throw. Instead, the Wildcats caught a break in the third inning

when the leadoff man reached on a dropped third strike. With one down, Rabun used a Panther error to put runners at the corners. From there, a bunt scored the runner from third, tying the game Two-and-a-half scoreless

innings ensued before Union County exploded in the fifth, doing most of its damage with two down. A one-out, RBI single by Mullanack scored Harkins, who led off the frame with a standup double. Back-to-back walks loaded the bags for Kelley, who brought home Mullanack with an RBI groundout.

A two-out grounder to second off the bat of Daniel resulted in a short-hopped throw to first that bounced into the dugout, bringing Scott and Swartz home. Youngblood kept the inning alive with a base hit to center, scoring Daniel, then Garrison followed suit with an RBI single up-themiddle to spot the Panthers a 7-1

Kelley's bases-loaded sacrifice fly in the sixth tacked on an additional Union County run and Garrison took the mound in the seventh, holding an 8-1 lead.

Up next - The Bremen Blue Devils await the Panthers as they enter the postseason ranked No. 3 and sporting a 23-5 record.

At home, Bremen has been near-unbeatable with its last home loss coming on Feb. 15 to an eventual 24-win South Paulding squad from Class 6A. The Blue Devils are an

upperclassmen-heavy squad with nine seniors and six juniors. Like Union County, Bremen is coming off two sub-par seasons in Class AAA. After finishing 6-12 in region and 10-16 overall in 2017, the Blue Devils bounced back with a 17-11 record in 2018 but just missed the playoffs with a 10-8 mark -- good enough for fifth place in Region 6-AAA. Bremen features a deep, ex-

perienced pitching staff anchored by five seniors - Carson Cook, Brant Ivey, Ethan Brock, Ben Barrow and Jack Allen.

The lineup includes plenty of power, most notably junior Jimbo Brown and seniors Brody Parkerson and Ivey.

Atop the order are a pair of spark plugs in juniors Cooper Cartwright and Brooks Hardie - who also have long ball capabilities if you make a mistake over the middle of the plate.


Game one is slated for Wednesday at 4:30 p.m. with game two to follow. Thursday will tart at 5:30 p.m. if necessary.








Senior Hunter Kelley with family


