> Barry Wayne Gerald, 46, of Blue Ridge, has charges of trafficking meth, possession of less than an ounce of marijuana and crossing the guard lines with drugs, according to the Sheriff's Office.

> State law defines trafficking as being in possession of more than 28 grams of meth. The higher the amount possessed, the harsher the penalty per conviction.

The 7 ounces of meth allegedly found in Queen, cases are made, by citizens McCarty and Gerald's possession equals roughly 199 grams. A conviction for trafficking between 28 and 200 grams of meth comes with a mandatory minimum of 10 years in prison and a fine of \$200.000.

If the amount of meth is between 200 and 400 grams, the penalty for trafficking increases to a mandatory minimum 15year prison sentence with a \$300,000 fine.

'It's like we've preached Sarah Mae McCarty, 22, all along: don't do drugs or sell drugs in Union County," Sheriff Mack Mason said. 'There's a real good chance you're going to wind up paying the consequences, going to prison or whatever - we don't want anybody using or abusing drugs.

"We're still on the job. We would like to ask the citizens of the county, if you see suspicious activity, give us a call. It'll be an anonymous call; in other words, we won't be putting your name out, and we will investigate it aggressively.

That's how a lot of our that are aware and don't want this in their neighborhood. We aggressively answer all calls. Some calls turn out to not have anything to them, but some of them unfortunately do.

"If someone has a drug problem, help is available. They need to reach out to these resources before their addiction gets worse and/or they wind up with criminal charges.
