Union County soccer went two-for-two in its opening round playoff games after making its first postseason appearance in


us," Lady Panther head coach Tim Hunter said. "It wasn't just about getting the win, it was about making a statement. And I think we had a big statement win in the first round of the state Union County senior for-

ward Madison Yost entered the state playoffs just four goals shy of the century mark. And after her teammates provided a 2-0 cushion, Yost took over, scoring the final three goals of the first half.

With a Union victory all but guaranteed, Yost was able to focus on her personal milestone in the second half, and after bouncing three shots off the post, she finally converted No. 100 in the 89th minute off a Maddie

"She had a couple fly off the post and another two or three goals that are usually automatic goals so I think she was just waiting until the last possible second for dramatic effect," Hunter said, as he laughed and put his arm around Yost.

According to Yost, she didn't expect to have a shot at 100 in the first round, but when she went into halftime only needing one goal, that resulted in a change of her mind set.



second or third round," she said. 'Going back to my freshman year, I never thought I would be setting the school record (88 goals) so breaking it earlier this season was incredible, but getting to 100 was always in the back of my mind. Now that I've finally gotten here, it's just an incredible feeling."

Whether or not Yost would reach 100 goals was the only drama in the second half of Thursday night's Lady Panther victory. That wasn't the case for the guys, however, as they entered as the No. 4 seed and scored the program's first road playoff win in six years and its first ever victory as a 4-seed.

Winners of seven-in-arow, Union County entered the playoffs as perhaps the hottest team in Region 8-AA and head coach Leland Sarrell knew a 4-seed wasn't an accurate representation of his squad's level of play over the last month.

"I think our confidence level was higher than a normal 4-seed and we didn't feel like underdogs going into the game," he said. "As a team, we really hit our stride during the back half of the regular season and our boys feel like they can go out there and play with just about anyone right now."

Baseball: Bremen uses the long ball to power past Union County at State

BREMEN - Union County baseball saw its season come to a close at thirdranked Bremen during the opening round of the Class AA State Tournament, following a pair of one-sided losses to the Region 5-AA Champion Blue Devils on Wednesday,


Making its first postseason appearance in three years, Union County jumped on Bremen, 3-0 in the early stages of game one before a seven-run fourth inning tipped the scales in favor of the Blue Devils, and a sixth-inning grand slam opened the flood gates in an

The momentum from game one carried over as Bremen scored two in the first and third innings to take a 4-0 advantage in game two. The Panthers answered with two in the fourth, highlighted by a Coleson Daniel homerun, to cut the margin in half but the Blue Devils were too much, tacking on three more in the fifth and two in the seventh to take the game and the series by a 9-2 score.

Panthers 3, Bremen 11 - Entering last week's state tournament, the Bremen lineup was scoring at a clip of 8.3 runs per game but sophomore Isaak Mullanack held them in check until the fourth inning when a leadoff error and an infield single provided enough of a spark to ignite the potent Blue Devil offense.

When the dust settled on the bottom half of the fourth, Union County found itself in a 7-3 hole that was too deep to dig out of against a quality

"I think it was just a case of a good team making adjustments," Union County

Head Coach Zach Odom said of Bremen's seven-run inning. 'Our plan coming in was to keep them off-balance with breaking balls because we knew they would crush the fastball. The first time through the order, Isaak did a good job but the second time, the middle of their lineup adjusted to what we were doing and proved why they're such a great team."

The Panthers, however, had plenty of opportunities early on, beginning in the first when they stranded two runners. Mullanack would work a perfect first that came to a close when senior centerfielder Ean Harkins made a home run-saving catch, leaning out over the short outfield fence to make the backhanded grab.

Harkins' defense provided a pick-me-up for the Panthers as Alec Youngblood and Austin Garrison opened the second inning with back-toback singles before a Harkins bunt, resulting in the only Bremen error of the game, loaded the bases with nobody out.

Following a strikeout, Mullanack lined a double down two-run blast to right-center the left field line, scoring Garrison and courtesy runner Pey-

ton Ivester. An RBI groundout by Alec Scott brought home Harkins to spot Union County advantage.

The three-run lead would hold until the fourth thanks to some timely damage control by Mullanack, who pitched around a one-out single in the bottom of the second and a rare catcher's interference ruling in the third that put the sophomore right-hander in a two-on, nobody out jam that he eventually escaped with consecutive fly outs and a pop-up.

After a caught-stealing ended the Union half of the fourth, Bremen began the bottom half by reaching on a throwing error and an infield single. Following an RBI single, a hit-by-pitch and a sacrifice fly, the Panthers were clinging to a 3-2 lead when another run-scoring single and an RBI groundout to first gave the Blue Devils a 4-3 lead.

With two down, and trailing by only a run, Union County was unable to get out of the inning as a basehit made it a 5-3 game and a stretched the margin to 7-3 and closing the book on Mullanack. Harkins took over on the hill and brought the fourth to a close but not before the Panthers found themselves trailing by four.

Union had a chance to get back in the game during the fifth but left the bases loaded after a leadoff single by Scott and walks to Zeke Swartz and Youngblood brought the tying run to the plate with two

Harkins would retire six-straight batters before running into trouble with twodown in the sixth. After two walks put Bremen in business, the Panthers elected to load the bases with an intentional walk that backfired in the form of a two-out grand slam that blew things open at 11-3.

Panthers 2, Bremen 9 -Swartz allowed eight hits and six earned over six innings as Union County was unable to recover from an early 4-0

The Blue Devils used an RBI double and a two-out wild pitch to jump in front 2-0 in the first before a pair of fourth-inning doubles sandwiched around a two-out walk made it a 4-0 game.

"I was happy for Coleson," Odom said. "He's had an up-and-down year on the mound so I was extremely happy for him. He really stepped up for us the last two weeks after Cay-bo (Cayden Rich) went down.'

Bremen responded immediately, using a basesclearing double in the fifth to open up a 7-3 advantage.

Daniel spelled Swartz in the seventh and a leadoff error and a two-run homer with two down tacked on some insurance for the Blue

The Panthers finish the season at 14-12, its first winning record since 2016. The future looks bright for Coach Odom and crew as Union was led by a solid nucleus of sophomores with a few juniors and seniors sprinkled in.

Daniel, Harkins, Hunter

Kelley, Scott and Jonathan Everett each played a significant role in the success this season. The Panthers will return juniors Youngblood and Cayden Rich.

Rich, unfortunately, would the final two weeks of the season due to injury.

Highlighting a deep sophomore class was Mullanack, Swartz and Garrison, who along with Rich, will give Union County a solid foundation to its 2020 pitch-

Meanwhile, Littles, Ivester, Damien Chitwood and Matthew Kelley each stepped up and played a pivotal role during a Panther victory at some point during the season and should all see an increased role next season.

"It was a great learning experience for us," Odom said. "I told the underclassmen after the game that we might see Bremen again in the future and they're an example of the level we hope to reach. And if we do, we can expect to see that team again somewhere in the playoffs."
