

Spring football is underway; scrimmage May 18 at Chestatee

Strong turnout of 70 players participate in last week's spring drills

For the first time in 185 days, Union County High School returned to the gridiron on Monday for the opening of spring football practice.

Head Coach Brian Allison and staff begin the arduous task of replacing 15 seniors that compiled a 32-8 regular season record (32-11 overall) while tying the 2017 Senior Class for most wins over a four-year span.

As expected, turnout won't be an issue this spring as approximately 70 players took part in agility drills in preparation for spring practice.

"We kept around 65-70 (players) last week but I'd say closer to 70," Allison said. "The crazy thing about spring practice is, you have end-ofyear testing going on so we'll have players and coaches going in-and-out because of it. But I expect us to keep about 65-70 kids through the spring.

According to Allison. 12 freshmen took part in the pre-spring drills as the Panthers look to reload following the Class of 2018's departure. Most notable among the 15 graduated seniors is quarterback Cole Wright.

Allison's recent track record with quarterbacks has been quite stellar as Union County is breaking in just its third signal caller since 2013 following three successful years under Joseph Mancuso, who handed off to Wright for another two seasons.

Mancuso, currently a redshirt-sophomore in college, is battling for the starting job at FCS powerhouse Richmond University.

Meanwhile, Wright is preparing for his freshman year

a football scholarship to the prestigious New York military academy.

'The most obvious (position that we're watching closely) is quarterback," Allison said. "We've had to replace two really good quarterbacks over past five years and now we're just trying to determine who the next guy will be.'

The frontrunner to replace Wright is rising-junior Pierson Allison - Wright's backup for two seasons. Last year's junior varsity QB Kaston Hemphill will miss spring practice due to an injury but rising-senior wide receiver rusher Chad Buzzard returns Kanon Hemphill will see action behind center.

Kanon Hemphill began

at West Point after receiving his career at quarterback but made a seamless transition to receiver as a sophomore catching 21 passes while leading the Panthers with 401 yards and four touchdowns in 2016.

As for the receiving corps, that's one of two position groups -- along with run-ning back -- where depth isn't a concern for Allison.

Nine different receiv--- only two were seniors ers - caught a pass in 2017. Six different wide outs reeled in at least a dozen grabs and seven totaled 100-plus yards on the season

At running back, leading after posting two 100-yard games and seven total TDs in 2017.

The success of the new quarterback and his backfield mates will hinge on an offensive line that was also hit hard by graduation

The defensive side of the ball also features a few areas where Allison and company are eager to roll up their sleeves and get to work.

The 2018 season was an up-and-down year for the Union defense. The unit was stifling vs Banks County in game four and Fannin County in game nine. Unfortunately, things went south in October during a four-game skid where the Panthers allowed 713 yards and 62 points at East Hall, 510 yards and 52 points vs Dawson, then 637 yards and 55 points at North Hall, with a playoff spot

on the line.

"The secondary and linebacker are two areas where we're looking to find some guys," Allison said.

Of the 821 total tackles made by the defense last season, 411 were credited to seniors. The defense must also replace 16-of-41 tackles-forloss, 4-of-7 sacks, and 2-of-4 interceptions.
