# **Recruit Class Achievement**

Union County Fire Department is in constant need for more volunteers. There are many areas where citizens of Union County can volunteer and give back to the community. The greatest need is volunteer firefighters. Becoming a volunteer firefighter can be one of the most challenging and rewarding ways in which to serve your community. Last week, a group of dedicated individuals completed

the UCFD recruit class that qualifies them as National Professional Qualifications – Firefighter One (NPQ-FF1). Persons who wish to join the fire department as a volunteer firefighter

can enter the department at a support firefighter level. The class is approximately 40 hours and it teaches persons



how to operate on the fireground at a support level. Persons who wish to be actively engaged in fighting fire (going into burning buildings) must complete the recruit class to become NPQ-FF1 qualified.

The recruit class involves approximately 200 hours of classroom and hands-on firefighting training. Recruits are taught how to operate on the fireground and how to extinguish fires. They are also instructed on rescue operations and hazardous materials responses.

The recruit class began in January and the recruits have been in class two nights a week and every other Saturday. They have completed all testing required by Union County Fire Department and Georgia Firefighters Standards and Training Council (GFSTC).

Last Saturday was the recruit's final evaluation. Recruits were exposed to a live fire scenario in a burn building. The burn building is a metal building used for live fire training. A fire, consisting of wood and other material found in a home, is set and firefighters are exposed to the similar conditions of a residential fire.

Recruits are then required to enter the burn building and extinguish the fire using proper techniques. Recruits are exposed the heat, smoke, sounds, limited visibility, and other conditions of a fire. Instructors make every effort to create the same conditions that a firefighter would experience on a residential structure fire. Although the recruits are being evaluated, they are gaining valuable knowledge and experience that will assist them when they respond to an actual emergency.

The recruit class has worked hard and has done an amaz-

# **Pot: Dazed and Confused** For How Long?

How long does marijuana leave young people dazed and confused? How long does it take for their brains

to bounce back? About three days, according to new research published in the journal of JAMA

Psychiatry. The study which looked at the immediate impact of how marijuana

impacts the brain in young people, found that when adolescent chronic marijuana users laid off the drug for 72 hours, their cognitive functions returned almost to the level of non-users. That means that for up to 3 whole days though, their conscious mental activities (such as thinking, understanding, learning, and remembering) was impaired to some degree.

But while the immediate impact appears

# **Steve McQueen**

Remember actor Steve McQueen? He was known as the "King of Cool." Do you know what his most valued possession was? It's probably not what you think.

The 1968 Ford Mustang GT 390 used in his movie "Bullitt" splashed ink into the movie memorabilia headlines in 2018. After the car's location had been a mystery for decades, its owner

agreed to display it at a car show in Detroit. McQueen had tried several times to buy the famous Bullitt Mustang. The last time was in 1977, ten years after he filmed the movie. He never owned it.

McQueen had a reckless bad boy image. It started young. Aban-

doned in his infancy by his father, his mother handed him over to her parents. At age eight, she took him back. The stepfather was abusive, so he lived as a delinquent on the streets. His mother eventually remanded him to a home for boys. He left there at 16 for serial jobs as a merchant marine, oil field roughneck, and carnival barker.

He joined the U.S. Marine Corps in 1947. They instilled some discipline in him, but only after he spent time in the brig. After his enlistment, he took up acting. But even while becoming the world's highest-paid actor, his life was plagued by broken relationships and substance abuse.

In his late 40s, he started pilot training. His flight instructor was Sammy Mason. Mason became a father figure to McQueen, but more importantly he was a Christian willing to offer answers to McQueen's questions about God and faith. McQueen began attending church with Mason. Within three months he had enough answers, so Steve McQueen believed in Christ Jesus.

Six months later, he was diagnosed with a form of lung cancer caused by asbestos. After U.S. doctors told him no other treatment was available, he sought alternatives in Mexico. It was there Billy Graham visited him, and gave McQueen his personal Bible. It immediately became McQueen's most valued possession. He died three days later with that Bible in his hands. It was just before Thanksgiving in 1980. He was only 50. Now you know the rest of the story, also told in his wife's book STEVE MCQUEEN: THE LAST MILE, and the movie STEVE MCQUEEN: AMERI-

# **Commissioner's Questions**

Q. Where will the county be obtaining fill dirt for the new road project into the Farmers Market?

A. The Leon Davenport Family has agreed to allow us to obtain the fill dirt from their property just across the highway near the new Sears store location. In addition, there will be other fill dirt hauled in from different locations that we may also utilize

### Q. We hear that Union County will be building a new access road from Highway 515 to School Circle. Is this true? A. This is in the design phase

right now. GDOT has suggested this would be a way to solve the access problem that will be created by a con-



crete median along the section of highway in front of the new Sears location on Highway 515 East. Currently, the new design for the Highway 515 widening includes a concrete median separating east bound and west bound traffic. This creates limited access for crossover traffic in this area. In other words, if you are coming from Young Harris and wanted to go to the new Sears location or the adjacent commercial property, you would have to go to the traffic signal at the Glenn Gooch By-Pass and make a U-turn. This concrete barrier will also cause left turn issues in the future for accessing the new county property. The County will also be negotiating with GDOT for assistance in constructing this proposed access road.

# Q. So how will a new road accessing Highway 515 and School Circle make this concrete median area work better?

A. If the county constructs this new road between Sears and the other commercial property, it will connect Highway 515 and School Circle. We are hoping GDOT will grant us an access point here that will allow for crossover traffic, so vehicles can turn left or right at this point as they do now. This will benefit everyone on both sides of the highway and would also help some of the school traffic by giving them another option for exiting this area. This is all very complicated and will take a lot of work, meetings, designs and some frustration along the way. We just met with GDOT in Gainesville again this week to further discuss the possibilities. However, we feel in the end, this will enhance the commercial area in this vicinity and improve safety with easier access for the

# **Solar Panels**

**Dear Editor**,

The question of solar panel production of energy has been brought up several times in letters to the editor. The question as to what this would mean to Union County GA has not been discussed. The following are facts to be used in analysis and suggested solutions.

a. Solar panels energy production (1 Gw hr per year requires 3.7 acres for the project) that means an acre would product 270,270 Kw hr annually. (National Renewable Energy Laboratory, NREL)

b. Cost to install solar panels is \$500,000.00 per acre (NREL)

c. Energy use in Union County for 2017 was 236,910,145 Kw hr (Blue Ridge Mountain EMC)

d. Govt. owned acres (USNF, TVA, County, State) 98,000 (Union County Board of Assessors)

e. Privately owned acres 106,736 (Union County Board of Assessors)

f. Solar panels have a life span of twenty to twenty-five years (NREL)

is a gathering of natural resource managers who are dedicated to bringing fire back into our mountain environment. Fire is a natu-

ral phenomenon that has occurred in our forests since the beginning of time and will continue long after we are gone no matter how hard we try to prevent it.

The Firewise and Fire Adapted programs don't try to prevent fire, but educate people who live in the wildland areas how to prepare and protect their property from the out-of-control wildfire that is coming to their backyard one day. Partners in the Southern Blue Ridge FLN (SBR FLN) collaborate to develop, share and apply the best available science to restore fire across a vast, diverse region. Partners and stakeholders work in teams in the network's eight landscapes to set and achieve restoration goals in their fireadapted pine and oak forests. Vegetation maps, models and tools developed by partners help build a cohesive vision and description of restoration needs. Landscape teams have adapted a regional treatment prioritization tool and applied it locally, with each learning from other landscapes' work.

The SBR FLN has also collaborated with the Cherokee National Forest Landscape Restoration Initiative, Central Appalachians FLN and LANDFIRE to adapt LANDFIRE models to this region. The models, along with a LiDAR-based forest structure analysis and the vegetation maps, have been used to estimate the loss of current vegetation from historic conditions across the National Forests of North Carolina. This information is informing forest planning and National Environmental Policy Analysis (NEPA) projects in several landscapes.

Fire history research on three SBR FLN landscapes is shaping prescribed fire regimes. Evidence that fire historically played a role in maintaining these forests-which are changing, due to almost a century of fire suppression-is also being used to build wider support for the use of controlled fire. Partnership burns across multiple ownerships have become common in most landscapes, and more are planned for the coming year. Partly because of the last SBR regional workshop in Hiawassee, GA, state agencies in North and South Carolina are now performing
