Baseball: UCHS introduces Odom as new head coach

Last week, Union County High School named Zach Odom as its fourth head baseball coach since 2010.

A 2013 UCHS graduate, Odom takes the job following the resignation of Robby Roxbury, who was at the helm for three seasons.

Odom was made aware of his hiring last Monday and the Young Harris grad was still a bit flabbergasted when he was introduced to the team on Tuesday.

"It was definitely a shock," Odom said. "I thought someday later down the road this might happen but hearing the news about Roxbury was definitely a surprise.

"I'm extremely excited about the opportunity and I want to do a lot of great things. It's been my life goal to come back here and now I just want to get things rolling."

four-year starter at shortstop where he was a part of two state tournament teams as a freshman and a senior.

In 2010, under the guidance of skipper C.T. Hussion, Union County baseball ended a 15-year postseason drought when they qualified for the Class AA State Tournament.

In 2013, first-year head coach Brandon Bradburn led Sweet 16 after defeating Bowdon in the first round of State - ending 18 years without a state playoff series victory.

Odom was also a fouryear starter in basketball and received All Region honors as a senior.

Upon graduating from UCHS, Odom signed a scholarship to Young Harris College, where he made an immediate impact.

As a freshman in 2014, he started 32 games and batted .288 with 2 homers and 17 RBIs.

He went on to hit .307 in 47 starts as a sophomore and .281 in 45 starts as a junior.

As a senior in 2017. Odom posted career highs in batting average (.352), RBIs (26), runs (34), doubles (12), while matching a career high with 3 home runs.

He finished his career with a .309 batting average, while recording 201 hits, 105 runs, 85 RBIs, 33 doubles, and 10 HR in 173 games.

Odom joined Roxbury's coaching staff at UCHS this past season helping lead the Panthers to a 10-19 record.

After replacing Bradburn following the 2015 season, Roxbury led the Panthers to a 19-9 record, a Region 8-AA title, and a State Elite 8 appearance in 2016.

However, Union County would finish with a combined 20-34 record over the next two seasons as members of a brutal Region 7-AAA.

"I'm just excited," Odom said in closing. "I know it came a little early but I'm just really excited to have this opportunity. I hope to teach these kids about more than baseball and win a couple championships along the way.

Softball: Battle of Blood Mountain to decide CWS berth

DAHLONEGA - The Peach Belt Conference Tournament failed to give local softball fans the rematch they desired, but rest easy, the NCAA Super Regionals have delivered.

The top-ranked University of North Georgia (59-2) will host Young Harris College (35-19) in a best-of-three series beginning on Thursday with the winner to advance to the College World Series.

The two teams met earlier in the season and fans were treated to pair of classics. In the first meeting, Young Harris shocked the Nighthawks and Peach Belt Pitcher of the Year Kylee Smith, handing UNG just their second loss of the season, 4-3.

North Georgia rallied to take game two 8-4 and they haven't lost since.

Meanwhile, Young Harris entered the PBC tournament as the No. 4 seed but were upset by fifth-seeded Lander in the opening round.

Six days later, the Mountain Lions found their groove in Hickory, NC as the seventhseed in the NCAA Southeast Region 2.

YHC thumped the second-seeded host Lenoir-Rhyne 9-4 in game one. They continued to roll as they throttled thirdseeded Carson-Newman 7-1 on Friday

Lenoir-Rhyne responded in a do-or-die game on Saturday, using a three-run walk-off homer vs YHC to force the dreaded "if necessary" game.

The extra softball didn't faze the Mountain Lions, who rallied from a 2-0 deficit for a 9-3 victory - punching their ticket to the Super Regionals in Dahlonega.

Meanwhile, UNG picked up where they left off in the PBC tournament, running roughshod over King (twice) and Coker in the NCAA Regionals.

Coker, like YHC, owned an earlier win over the Nighthawks but fell 6-0 to North Georgia in the Friday rematch.

On Thursday, UNG defeated King 5-2 before routing them 9-1 in the final game on Saturday.

Game one of the NCAA Super Regionals is 2 p.m. Thursday, game two will be noon Friday. The "if necessary" game will follow on Friday.

Admission at UNG is \$10 for adults, \$5 for students, children 7&U are free.
