

Golf: Lady Panther seniors go out with four top-four finishes at State

HARTWELL - The Union County senior trio of Ally Horinek, Megan Rowe, and Grace Wischmeyer wrapped up their high school careers as three of the most decorated athletes in UCHS history.

Three straight region titles, two state runner-ups, a third, and a fourth place finish at state will forever highlight the resumes of the three members of the Class of 2018.

The high school careers of Horinek, Rowe, and Wischmeyer came to a close last week with a fourth place finish at the Class AAA State Tournament, hosted by Cateechee Golf Club in Hartwell.

While fourth place isn't the way they wanted to go out, head golf coach Greg Chambers told his team they can hold their heads high knowing they never finished outside the top-four in two separate classifications (Class AA and AAA).

"I told them all that I was very proud of them and that I would miss them," he said. "They were a little down at first because their high school careers were over. I don't think they were down on themselves at all. I think they were just soaking everything in and enjoying being around each other as the tournament was coming to a close because it was the last time that we would all be together as a team.

"You always want to win the state tournament so we were a little disappointed from that standpoint but we are happy with our finish. To be one of the top four teams in the state is always an accomplishment."

According to Chambers, it was also a little bittersweet knowing their run at come to an end,

"I have coached for a long time and this was one of the toughest goodbyes that I can remember in my career. "I think it started sinking in with the girls on their last few holes, but it was very evident as they all approached the 18th tee box and as they walked off the 18th green for the last time as a Union County Panther."

Union County finished the two-day tournament at 91over par (523) - nine shots back of third place North Murray and nine strokes better than fifth place Pierce County. (The sum of the three lowest individual scores account for the team total)

On day one, Union returned to the clubhouse at 46over par (262). They were one shot better on day two, finishing at +45 (261) but it wasn't enough to contend with the leaders, Rutland and Bremen.

"I just told them to go play and not worry about everyone else, just go have fun and enjoy their last 18 holes as a Lady Panther," Coach Chambers said when asked how his squad approached the second round knowing it would take a remarkable comeback to threaten the top-two.

Horinek came in five shots back of sixth place Christian Williams of Bremen and 12 shots off the lead of Murray County's Tori Owens, who fired a 1-under par 71 in the second round to erase a four-shot deficit entering the day.

Meanwhile, Wischmeyer and Rowe turned in matching scores in both rounds.

Wischmeyer fired a pair of 89s while Rowe completed her tournament with two 92s.

Rounding out the Union County scoring was junior Carson Chambers, who finished at 112 in round one and 114 in round two.

As for Horinek, the team's low medalist started and finished strong but it was the 18 holes in between that prevented her from challenging for an individual title.

On Monday, she opened the tournament with a 39 (+2)on the front nine but went on to play the final three holes of the round at 5-over for a 42 (+7) on the back nine

On day two, the Maryville signee reeled off three straight pars on 6,7, and 8 to turn in a 43 (+6) on the front nine. Unfortunately, the final two holes continued to give her trouble as she finished at +3 on 17 and 18, two shots better than her +5 Monday score over the last two holes.

Wischmeyer's two-day total of 178 (+34) was good enough for a top-15 finish individually.

Rowe finished the tournament as Union County's birdie leader with two - both coming Monday on the front nine.

Following a bogey on one, Rowe picked up the birdie on the second hole, a 153-yard

Individually, Rowe came in 23rd with a 184 (+40) twoday total.

As for Chambers, the junior scored a 3 on the Par 3 second hole to highlight a front nine score of 54. She would fire a 58 on the back nine for a opening round total of 112.

Chambers solid play on the second hole continued as she picked up another par early in round two. Later in the day, she recorded another par on the Par 3 sixteenth.

Chambers, however, would save the best for last as her back-nine score of 53 on day two was her nine-hole low for the tournament.

This season marks the second year that the State Championship has been determined by two rounds instead of one. According to Coach Chambers, Union County has benefited from both formats but both usually the team that leads after day is able to hold on.
