"Back then, you just didn't say the word cancer," said McGraw. "Then, some people would say, 'Well, I only had one treatment, so I shouldn't be out there with those that really suffered.'

"But I keep telling them, year after year, once you hear the word cancer, you start surviving that day. It doesn't matter if its five years or 50 years, everybody's battle is different.





