

Union County basketball undergoes major changes at the top

Garrett replaces Jones as men's coach; Buford's Crystal Beach takes the helm of Lady Panthers

Both Union County basketball teams are going to look very different when they take the court in November.

Union County High School Principal C.T. Hussion made the official announcement last Thursday, May 30 that boys' head basketball coach Casey Jones was stepping down after six seasons.

Earlier in the day, Jones broke the news to the team, who is preparing for the summer camp season, beginning at Tennessee Wesleyan this week.

They also learned that a familiar face would taking the reigns as former boys assistant and current Lady Panthers head coach Corey Garrett would immediately replace Jones.

Garrett was an assistant under Jones in 2016-17 before taking over the Lady Panthers a year later. This year's senior class were freshmen during Garrett's one season on the boys' bench and played under him during middle school.

Garrett also had to break the news to his Lady Panther squad that he's led for the last two seasons while introducing his replacement, Dr. Crystal Beach, who becomes the basketball program's first female head coach since parting ways with Robbie Stancil in 2004 -- three seasons removed from a State title game appearance.

Beach comes to Union County by way of Buford where she was an assistant under legendary coach Gene Durden.

The Lady Wolves are fresh off their third-straight State Championship while winning seven state titles under Durden since 2009.

Overall, Durden has compiled an 808-214 record in 31 years of coaching -- the last 14 coming at Buford.

Her volleyball teams won four-consecutive Region Championships while finishing 41-0, en route to the program's first state title in 2015.

Buford volleyball has won two state titles, finished as runnerup twice and reached four final fours since 2014. As the head coach in 2018, Beach received Region 8-5A Coach of the Year honors after leading her team to the final four despite graduating a half-dozen All Region/Area players

Beach, a Virginia native, and a graduate of Virginia Tech, spent time coaching in the Commonwealth before heading south to Gainesville's Lakeview Academy

From there, she made the move to Buford, where she spent the previous eight years helping shape the basketball and volleyball programs.

When asked what she's looking forward to about mov-Beach was a part of four ing to mountains, she didn't running as soon as possible. hesitate.

"The people," Beach replied. "Everyone has been so warm and welcoming. Part of what drew me here was the notion of 'family' and 'Union United.'

As for her Lady Panther players, they made a wonderful first impression on their new coach, as well.

"Walking into the gym today as they were practicing, I saw a lot of hustle and effort," she said. "As a coach, that's something you're always excited to see

"I'm also really excited about the talent. I've heard nothing but good things about this core group of young women that we have coming back. I'm excited to have the opportunity to continue developing them as players but they also seem like amazing young women.'

Due to remaining obligations at Buford, Beach won't be available to coach during this week's University of North Georgia and UGA basketball camps but she plans to hit the ground

the coaching duties. Hunter is also expected to assist Beach during the upcoming season.

"I'm just excited and honored to be here and I'm ready to jump in and get going," Beach added.

Garrett, meanwhile, is able to dive right in and get reacquainted with the guys' squad at this week's Tennessee Wesleyan camp and the Union County camp on June 17-18.

Garrett replaces Jones, who stepped down to focus on his administrative duties. Prior to the 2018-19 school year, Jones accepted an administrative position at Union County Schools. However, with the responsibilities of his new job, combined with two children at home, he felt he was no longer able to dedicate 100% to his coaching duties.

Jones won 91 games during his six seasons, reaching four state tournaments while leading Union to its first state playoff victory in 15 years during the 2015-16 season. Jones was also in Garrett's current position when he was an assistant under former

coach Mandy Hunter will handle head coach David Tucker before replacing him prior to the 2013-14 season.

In year one, Jones led the Panthers to their first postseason appearance in five years. And Jones believes that the transition to Garrett will also be a smooth one and both teams are in excellent hands.

"I'm excited about the future of our basketball programs; Corey and Crystal are going to do a great job," Jones said.

He also took a moment to reflect on the time spent coaching his alma mater.

"I appreciate the opportunity that I've been given over the past six years," Jones said. 'When I got into education, my dream was to coach boys high school basketball at Union County and I was able to do that for six years.

"I definitely appreciate all the people who made that happen but the relationships with the guys will be the best part. The cool thing is, many of the guys I coached have remained local so I get to see them and those are lifetime relationships that I've built.

"I want to thank everyone that's helped me from assistants to administrations but especially Coach Anthony Payne and Coach Kevin Hughes.

"Kevin has been there with me the whole time and I'm convinced that what success we had wouldn't have been possible without Kevin. He's a good guy and a really good friend of mine.

"I definitely have to thank Emily (wife) and our two kids (Reese and Cash). They have been my biggest supporters."

Jones leaves a stocked cupboard with four returning starters from last season's 17-win squad; Hughes is also expected to return as an assistant coach.

However, Garrett could face a slight rebuild entering 2020-21 following the Class of 2020's departure.

'We have a pretty good (upcoming) senior class but we kind of skipped the junior class (2021)," Garrett said. "I'm actually pretty excited about the sophomore class (2022) because it's a little deeper than I thought it was. So I'm looking forward to it, we have a nice senior class, a deep sophomore class, the freshmen are stepping up and they all play hard, so right now, we're looking good."

According to Hussion, the groundwork for long-term athletic success is being laid at all levels. As UCHS continually raises the bar with top-notch coaching staffs, along with the improvements underway at the recreation department, Panther athletics are on the verge of setting a new standard like never before in Union County.

"With the new athletic facilities on the way thanks to the investments made by this community, we're just starting to see (what we're capable of)," Hussion said. "And when you combine that with program building under (new athletic director) Dr. (Banks) Bitterman and the plan we have going forward, we're set up really well for the future.'
