This will be McBride's first trip to Hiawassee, though not her first trip to Georgia, as the majority of her fan-base comes from the Southeastern region of the U.S.

During the June 23 show, the audience can expect to hear a little bit of everything from McBride, including songs from her most recent album, "Reckless."

"I'm going to be doing a lot of my hits during this show," said McBride. "I'll also be doing songs from my new album, Reckless, and a couple of cover songs. It's going to be a fun night. My whole goal is to create an environment where everybody can forget about this crazy world we're living in for a couple of hours and just really enjoy music and being together.
