

Panthers reach semifinals of Flowery Branch's Battle at the Branch

Flowery Branch - The Union County football team earned the nickname "Giant Killer" at last week's Battle at the Branch 7-on-7 tournamenthosted by Flowery Branch High

The FBHS stadium and two practice fields hosted nonstop, all day action as 15 teams took part in a five-game, pool play format, beginning at 9

At the conclusion of pool play, a single elimination tournament was held to crown a champion and the Panthers fell three points short of a berth in the title game.

"Sometimes in these (7-on-7 tournaments), you get momentum on your side and things start to go your way," head coach Brian Allison said afterwards. "A bad call here, or a dropped pass there can put you in the right position to have some success.

Union received its "Giant Killer" moniker by playing the role of "David" in a tournament filled with Goliaths.

During the pool play segment, four of the Panthers' five games were against schools in a larger classification.

Then, later in the day, when the tournament was whittled down to eight teams in the quarterfinals - the Panthers (who compete in AAA with AA enrollment numbers) were by far, the smallest school remaining.

Two of the final eight were from Georgia's largest classification, AAAAAAA, four belonged to AAAAAA, and one came from AAAA.

The Panthers offense was led by returning quarterback Cole Wright, with backup Pierson Allison also seeing action throughout the day.


