

Football: Panthers split 7-on7 contests, host youth camp

Union County finished with a record of 1-1 while hosting the summer's first 7-on-7 session. The Panthers took a one-sided loss to Lumpkin County but bounced back with a victory over Gordon Central on Thursday, June 12.

The Panthers' win over Gordon Central left all three teams with a 1-1 record after Gordon Central defeated Lumpkin in the day's second matchup. Each contest included

two 10-minute sessions for each offense, during which, both teams executed every play starting from their opponent's 40-yard line. Afterward, the junior varsity (JV) squads took the field for two 5-minute sessions, also running plays from the 40-yard line.

After the JV action, both varsity teams returned to the field for a 15-minute, full-scale 7-on-7 contest where scores were recorded.

Rising sophomore quarterback Kamden Kendrick took all the snaps for the varsity squad due to a broken hand suffered by rising senior QB Cade Dockrey the previous week at a Shorter football camp.

Dockrey had surgery last week and is expected to resume throwing in 2-3 weeks, but it could be at least six weeks before he can participate in full

The camp will run daily from 9 a.m. to noon at Union County High School. Registration is \$60 per athlete.

A strong lineup of collegiate coaches will lead the instruction, offering athletes a chance to sharpen their skills and learn from some of the region's top basketball minds.

The instructors include: Ronnie Carr, drafted by the Atlanta Hawks out of Western Carolina University. He made the first 3-point field goal in college basketball history (Nov. 29, 1980). Carr was a two-time All-Southern Conference and an All-Freshman team selection who averaged 18 points per game as a three-year starter. He led the conference in scoring in 1982 and scored 20 or more points in almost half of his games.

In late February, Harmon was named Conference Carolinas' Men's Tennis Player of the Week, dominating with four straight wins against Mars Hill University and Lander University.

Away from his own training, Harmon is a sport and recreation major who is heavily involved with tennis in the community. He is a coach and hitting partner for promising junior and/or professional players. As graduation is approaching quickly, Harmon plans on coaching tennis either at the college or high-level junior circuit. The passion for the sport runs in his entire family, as they all currently play and were taught by his father at a very
