of three things. If you have weekly garbage pickup at your home, you can just place it in there to be picked up by your garbage service. You can take the litter in the orange bags to the Transfer Station on Deep South Farm Road or the Convenience Center at the intersection of Highway 515 and Highway 325. You will not be charged to dispose of the litter you have collected at these locations. Finally, you can call the Union County Road Department at (706) 439-6062 and coordinate a location for them to come and pick the bags up. This location could be at the end of your driveway or at

the beginning of the road you pick up, for example. Q. How does this pro-

gram benefit Union County and its citizens?

A. If someone adopts a portion of a road and cleans up the litter, that is just one more portion of a road that the county detainee crews do not have to clean up. This in turn saves the taxpayers the cost of that crew cleaning up that portion of the road, and the crew can be working on another project within the county. It has the potential to save the county thousands of dollars per year on litter clean up and helps keep your area of the county looking better.

As of September 2017, the website GoodRx.com reported that Gabapentin, approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 1993, was among the mostdispensed prescriptions in the United States.

Gabapentin affects the brain and the nervous system and works to stabilize the electrical activity in the brain. Those who abuse Gabapentin may take it with other medicines, including opioids and anti-anxiety medications, to experience relaxation or a sense of calm, intense pleasure, and a high that some have described as like that of marijuana. People who use alcohol with Gabapentin may feel dizzy or increased sleepiness, the FDA warns.

Many doctors have been prescribing Gabapentin in place of opiates for bad backs and other nerve pain afflictions to quell the opiate crisis. In fact, Gabapentin has been thought to have a low addiction liability level. However, this drug is now being diverted at an alarming rate.

As of right now, Gabapentin is not scheduled under the Controlled Substances Act (CSA), but that may change quickly. Several overdoses have been reported where Gabapentin has been abused with opiates like Oxycodone. Because of this, there is a call to place Gabapentin in the CSA.

Diversion occurs when someone diverts a medication from its intended purpose to an unlawful one. Theft is a great example of diversion. This may occur in a pharmacy robbery to steal drugs, or it may happen in a convalescent hospital when an employee or other trusted person steals medication from a patient. Theft of Gabapentin is just one way people are diverting the drug.

Another form of diversion is by doctor shopping. Here, a drug user may go to several doctors with the same symptoms or affliction in an effort to be prescribed Gabapentin. Although most states have a prescription monitoring program to detect doctor shopping, the system is only as good as the information going into it. Gabapentin diversion also occurs when people share

medication between each other or trade it on the street.

How bad is the problem and who is abusing this? Kentucky has seen a staggering 2,950% increase in Gabapentin misuse among prescription opioid abusers. Another study showed that up to 65% of opioid addicts have a Gabapentin prescription. Many addicts use the drug to treat their own addiction outside of medical

Most, but not all, of the people under the influence of Gabapentin will be using another drug like an opiate. This may cause some confusion, but the person will still be high. To put it simply, they will look like they are drunk, but you won't detect any odor of alcohol or they may test low or .00 on a blood alcohol screening test.

There's also concern that people who are in drug addiction recovery can easily abuse it for its euphoric effects. According to a report by StatNews. com, Gabapentin can enhance euphoric feelings caused by an opioid and keep drug withdrawal at bay. The medication also can get past the blocking effects of medicines used in addiction treatment, which means clients can still get high.

People who have abused Gabapentin and now find themselves addicted to the drug are advised to avoid going cold turkey. Instead, consider entering a professional addiction recovery treatment center that can help you detox safely from the substance and help you into a treatment program where

you address your addiction and learn the tools to a healthy, drug-free life.
