

Panthers finish as runner-up at Reinhart 7-on-7 tourney North Hall places first, needs six OTs to take down Union Co.

The Panthers came within a whisker of taking home first place at last Thursday's Reinhardt University 7-on-7 tournament, held on a hot and humid afternoon in Waleska.

Union County finished 2-1 in pool play, earning the No. 2 seed and a first-round bye during the championship tournament. However, they ultimately lost the title game to North Hall after an intense battle that required six overtimes to settle.

"I think we had a pretty good showing," said Union County first-year head coach Rob Stowe. "(7-on-7) is not real football, don't get me wrong, but I like the fact that we stood toe-to-toe with North Hall and didn't back down, even when they tried to push us around a little bit."

In the championship matchup against North Hall's first team (the Trojans fielded two squads at the event), both defenses held strong, preventing any scores on the first two possessions for each squad, resulting in a 4-4 tie.

After North Hall finally broke through with a touchdown, Union found themselves facing a 10-4 deficit. However, the Panthers responded when Kamden Kendrick connected with Chetley Cox for a touchdown with just over five minutes left in the game.

But two plays later, North Hall regained the lead with a score, making it 16-10. Nevertheless, Union drove deep into North Hall's territory and, on the final play of regulation, Kendrick hit Mikey Davis in the endzone, tying the score at 16-16. Unfortunately, the Panthers' extra-point attempt failed, sending the game into overtime.

During the extra session, each offense took turns from the 5-yard line with both squads failing to complete a pass during their first three attempts.

In the fourth overtime, North Hall completed a pass to a receiver streaking across the back of the endzone, but the receiver failed to get a foot inbounds after coming down with the leaping grab. Union's attempt resulted in an interception, but moments later, linebacker Micah Wallace swatted away a North Hall

throw in the fifth OT.

However, following a Panthers' incompletion in the sixth overtime, North Hall finally found paydirt, ending the contest and taking home first place.

'We're still installing a new offense and have only gotten in about 50% of our playbook," Stowe said. "We are hampered a little bit at the moment with Cade Dockrey's hand injury. Right now, Kamden Kendrick is getting every snap at quarterback, which is really helping him and his growth process.

Union earned a spot in the finals by defeating the third-seeded Georgia Knights Christian Community College, a prep school based out of Stockbridge.

The Panthers picked up a 24-8 victory after a touchdown pass from Kendrick to Dom Tarbert and a Bentley Rich away from the tournament point-after spotted Union a feeling like defense could be a 9-3 lead.

possession, finding Cox on a 40-yard touchdown pass. Wallace put an exclamation point on Union's victory, picking off a pass in the final seconds.

The Panthers opened pool play with a 17-9 win over Johns Creek, beginning with a Davis touchdown grab and a Haze Burnett PAT. Johns Creek answered with nine consecutive points but Union went back on top when Kendrick hit Burnett (PAT failed) and the defense came up with a critical late stop

"Defensively, I think we grew a lot on Thursday," Stowe said. "Again, it 7-on-7, so we know it's a pass every down so you don't have to worry about the element of the run, but it was still good for our guys to defend multiple formations, motions and different concepts. But I was really pleased with the defense. I think we came

closed the gap within two.

The game was tied at 2-2 early on when Cox came down with a jump ball and went untouched into the endzone, giving the Panthers their first lead at 9-2. North Hall then responded with a touchdown, but their unsuccessful PAT attempt left the score at 9-8.

Later in the game, Union faced a crucial fourth down that could have resulted in a 2-point stop and the lead for North Hall. However, senior Tyler Parker hauled in a pivotal touchdown catch from Kendrick, extending Union's lead to 16-8.

In the final pool play matchup, Union County faced North Hall's first team with the No. 1 seed on the line. The Trojans secured a 19-8 victory, aided by a late touchdown pass after Union trailed 12-9.

Both teams struggled offensively, with a pair of interceptions awarding North Hall an early 6-2 lead. The Trojans' first touchdown drive was bolstered by a questionable pass interference call,

However, Kendrick responded quickly by connecting with Parker on the Panthers' next play, cutting the deficit to 12-9. Unfortunately, the Panthers couldn't make a crucial defensive stop, and North Hall added a late touchdown as time expired.

On Tuesday, June 24, Union County attended a padded camp at Habersham Central, getting off to a slow start in their practice sessions vs. Chestatee and North Hall. However, the Panthers finished strong with four touchdowns in 10 minutes vs. Habersham, while the defense allowed only one over the same span.

"We didn't get off the bus very well against Chestatee," Stowe said. "They run a unique offense that we didn't have time to prepare for, but the dissappointing part was how North Hall pushed us around. But I fell like we finished well against Habersham Central, so we were able to leave feeling good about something."

This week marks the GHSA's mandatory dead week, but Union will resume off-

to Calhoun on July 15 to prac-

tice with Gordon Central and a few teams from Tennessee in an event similar to last week's padded camp at Habersham Central.

"It will be a bunch of teams that we know nothing about," Stowe said. "Which is good as we get closer to the season, because it allows you to fine tune what you're trying to do against teams you're not going to see during the season."

Conditioning gets underway on Monday, July 21. The team will be in full pads on July 28.

Union scrimmages at Chestatee on Aug. 8 and then opens the season with a bye week before hosting Gilmer on Aug. 22.

'We're making strides and we're learning from it all: The good, the bad and the ugly. The important thing is, our young men are starting to play the game with passion all the time - not just every once in a while. As we get closer to doing that, we're going to have more success down the road."
