Upcoming Brannon Jones Memorial Camp: More than just football

Union County High School will once again be the site of the Brannon Jones Memorial Football Camp.

Following the overwhelming success of last year's inaugural event that drew nearly 80 athletes, camp founder Luther Jones is looking to broaden the focus in 2017.

The 2016 camp featured an emphasis on defense - due to the majority of instructors coming from that side of the ball - but Luther Jones says this year's edition will provide a can't miss opportunity for players of any position or skill set.

"This year I'm going to bring in guys for both the offense and defense, so it's really going to be more of a football fundamental camp," said Luther Jones, a Kennesaw State defensive lineman and son of the camp namesake Brannon Jones. "We'll break up into offense and defense and we'll also do some competitions. We'll start off with agility for the first half, then have lunch, then it will be all football for the second half."

He also wanted to stress that the camp is about teaching life lessons through football. Since the camp is in honor of his late father, it's very near and dear to his heart, and he wants each and every camper to realize that someone out there cares about them.

"It is a football camp so we want to go out there and get after it, but our biggest goal is to allow the kids the opportunity to ask questions," Luther Jones said.

"We want to love these kids and get to know them, let them get to know me and learn the story of my dad."

"The biggest thing for me isn't just football, but to let the kids know that they have someone to talk to if they ever need help with anything. It's

about building relationships and letting them know they can talk, not only to me, but to any of the guys up there."

Joining Luther Jones as camp instructors will be 14 current NCAA football players, along with local coaches and two professional players.

The two pros at the camp will be Dante Blackmon of the Indianapolis Colts, who was also at last year's camp as a Kennesaw State Owl.

Recently, Blackmon became the first KSU football player to sign with an NFL team.


The other pro that will be on hand is Derrick Farrow - a former KSU Owl that recently signed with the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes.

For anyone who is still on the fence in regards to attending the camp, Luther Jones is quick to point out that the opportunity to receive instruction from players in the professional and college ranks, doesn't come around very often - especially in the Northeast Georgia mountains.

Cole Wright discusses camps, recruiting, and his recent visit to West Point

Union County rising-senior quarterback Cole Wright has been busy.

Between summer workouts, 7-on-7 tournaments, camps, and recruiting visits, the month of June has taken the Panthers dual threat QB up-and-down the east coast.

However, the North Georgia News was able to catch up with Wright for an interview regarding his June 22 visit to West Point, where he toured the campus and met the coaching staff that recently sent a scholarship offer his way.

NGN: At this point, what schools have shown an interest in you?

CW: Army is the only offer but Furman is definitely showing some interest but they

haven't offered anything yet.

NGN: As for your Army visit, what was your impression of the coaching staff?

CW: I got to talk to the head coach for a little while but I spent most of the day with the offensive coordinator (Brent Davis) and they are awesome guys. They (coaching staff) came from Georgia Southern and they are all just great guys.

NGN: What have the coaches said about how you would fit into the triple option offense and what would the transition from a shotgun-spread style be like for you?

CW: (Army has) always been a triple option offense and I don't see that changing anytime soon. They could incorporate a few spread plays but they will always remain true to the option.

Being under center is definitely something different. I've never played under center,

but it's a great school and if I decide to go there I'll just have to learn to take snaps.

NGN: Have you had a chance to look at the depth chart with the coaches and have they given an idea on how soon you could see the field?

CW: I didn't see all of (the depth chart) but I know their starting quarterback is a senior. They did tell me that even if I didn't play quarterback, they could find a position for me. They're going to give me a chance at quarterback but told me I could play receiver, cornerback, or safety.

NGN: How do you feel about the location (upstate New York) and playing in cold weather?

CW: It's far away but the opportunity is just too good to pass up. As far as playing cold weather, that's just something I'll have to adapt to.

NGN: What qualities in a school and/or coaching staff

is most important to you and will weigh the heaviest in your decision?

CW: I want a degree that will go a long way, and a degree from West Point would really stand out. When people see that, it's guaranteed to get you in the door almost anywhere. But really, as long as it's a quality school, I'm open to going anywhere.

NGN: Since the 7-on-7 tournaments ended a few weeks ago, what else has been going on, football-wise?

CW: I went to the Mercer camp and it went really well. I only got to stay for a couple of days but I won the long distance throw (67 yards) and the accuracy (competitions).

They said they really liked me and would keep in touch. I haven't heard anything from them since the camp, but it was only a few days ago.
