UCSO seizes 6 kilos of meth worth \$600,000

Detectives with the Narcotics Division of the Union County Sheriff's Office made their biggest ever bust of crystal methamphetamine on Tuesday, July 10, confiscating 6 kilos of meth worth approximately \$600,000 in street value.

UCSO Capt. Chad Deyton, Lt. Tyler Miller and Deputy Drew Stewart worked the case, which culminated in the record-setting seizure of three arrests on the evening of July 10.

The investigation started in June, when the sheriff's office received information that a woman named Janice Hall had been selling meth out of a residence in the south end of the

county, said Capt. Deyton.

"We conducted an investigation and made several buys from Janice Hall," said Capt. Deyton. "We executed a search warrant (July 10) on her residence, where we located roughly 6 kilos of methamphetamine and approximately \$3,000 worth of cash. Two vehicles were seized

Missing teens found 'safe and unharmed' in Franklin, TN

Authorities have located two teens who were missing from Union County since July 3, according to the Union County Sheriff's Office.

Kirstin Ledford and Cole Garrett, both 16, were discovered about four hours away by law enforcement in Franklin, Tennessee, at approximately 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, July 14, according to the sheriff's office.

"Both juveniles have been found safe and unharmed because they were attempting to shoplift ice cream at a Target in Franklin, Tennessee," said UCSO Det. Marc Pilote. "Target notified the police department.

"The police came, and upon identifying who the juveniles were, they found out that they were listed as missing

from Union County. Since they were listed as missing, authorities in Franklin elected not to pursue charges on them.

"In turn, they contacted us, and we contacted their parents to go pick them up. Hopefully, they don't run away again."

Early voting for July 24 runoff election ends Friday

Early voting for the Georgia Primary Runoff Election is now in its final week, and Election Day is on Tuesday, July 24.

This week, every day through Friday, July 20, registered Union County voters can cast their ballots early at the Union County Registrar's Office between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

The Registrar's Office is located within the Union County Courthouse and will be open to voters even during

lunchtime.

People who voted in the May 22 General Primary Election will have to stay with the same party for the runoff election.

Those who voted nonpartisan in May will need to declare a political party to receive a ballot for the runoff election.

Folks who didn't vote at all during the May 22 primary but were eligible to do so can vote in the July 24 runoff, and should they choose to, they will need to declare a political party to receive a ballot.

Blairsville now has a beautiful new welcome sign, or as local Rotary Club President Harvey S. Cohen refers to it, a new "Welcome Wall" located on the eastbound side of Georgia 515 next to the Park-N-Ride.

As the story goes, several years ago, someone at the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce came up with the idea of building a big welcome sign in Blairsville.

That idea, however, didn't catch on until former Rotary Club of Union County President William "Bill"

McGlamery began the push to make it happen two years ago.

Since then, McGlamery and immediate past Rotary President Rick Maddox have been the driving forces over the last two years in getting the Welcome Wall built.
