### Summer Heat

The year 2020 will go down in history as one of the strangest years on record. Everything has been strange and unusual. That includes this summer weather. We have seen a rainy and cool summer in June but in the last week or so, the summer heat has finally shown up. We may see temperatures climb to the high 90s and even over 100. The high temperatures combined with exposure to the sun can

take its toll. Union County Fire Department would like to provide some safety tips for heat related illnesses. COVID-19 has limited some of

the summer activities that we usually enjoy but there are still many outside activities for summer fun. If you are outside, it's a good idea to dress in



loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothes that cover as much skin as possible. Protect face and head by wearing a widebrimmed hat. Always remember the sunscreen. These tips can help you stay cool and safe during high temperature days.

The biggest concern associated with extreme heat is heat exhaustion and heat stroke. These conditions are treatable but can be deadly if allowed to progress. Heat exhaustion is usually the first to present. People who are in the extreme heat can begin showing symptoms after only a short amount of exposure.

Heat exhaustion symptoms include confusion, dizziness, fatigue, headache, muscle or abdominal cramps, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea, profuse sweating, cool, pale skin and high heart rate. Treatment for heat exhaustion is to remove the person from the heat, have them drink plenty of non-caffeinated fluids if the person is alert then cool the person. The symptoms usually resolve themselves. If the person doesn't recover from treatment or gets worse, call 911 for medical attention.

Heat stroke is a true emergency. The body has attempted to deal with the extreme heat but is no longer able to keep the body at a normal temperature. Heat stroke can lead to organ damage and death if untreated. The symptoms of heat stroke include the same as heat exhaustion except the person may become unresponsive, extremely confused, and their skin may be hot, dry, and flushed. Persons who are suffering from heat stroke should be evaluated in the emergency room. Call 911 if the person is showing symptoms or if you suspect heat stroke.

#### **Back to School**

To the Editor,

In 2019, there were 1.7 million students in grades 1-12 in Georgia. According to current GA DPH status, one person's death has been "attributed" to COVID-19 in the 5-17 age group.

In 2018, there were 1,509 deaths due to auto accidents in Georgia, 19 percent (286) of which were in the 15-20 age group. Only one teen has died of COVID-19 in Georgia.

Also in 2018, there were 1,404 drug overdose deaths in Georgia, 68 of which were due to opioids alone in the 0-24 age group. Only one teen has died of COVID-19.


The evidence shows that God is perfectly good and humanity is not. But God in His mercy made a way for you to share His righteousness. Jesus, God the Son, walked on this earth to display

### **Commissioner's Questions**

Q. I heard that the Governor's Executive Order dated July 15, 2020 states that counties and municipalities cannot mandate the wearing of masks. All of this is so confusing, so what does this mean?

A. This particular portion of his order simply means that city and county officials across the State of Georgia are not al-

lowed to pass laws and ordinances that require citizens to wear a mask at all times when out in public places. For example, as Commissioner, I cannot mandate citizens wear a mask while in the park, grocery stores or many other locations. Now, individual businesses can still require masks



be worn in their place of business if they chose to do so.

Q. I came to the courthouse and was required to wear a mask. Isn't this going against what Governor Kemp's Executive Order states?

A. The Governor's Executive Order dated July 15, 2020 says that no county or municipality within Georgia can pass an ordinance requiring citizens to wear a mask while in public or while on public property. But, there is also a stipulation in the Governor's Order that states any Judicial Order takes precedent over his own order. Since it is a Judicial Order that requires temperatures be taken and masks to be worn by anyone entering the Union County Courthouse this order takes precedent over the Governor's Order. So, if you enter the courthouse, you will be given a mask if you do not have one.

#### Q. Since early voting is taking place in the Union County Courthouse, is everyone who comes to vote required to wear a mask?

A. Yes. The Judicial Order in place by the Enotah Judicial Circuit makes wearing a mask in the courthouse a requirement by all who enter, so this includes coming in to vote. All the poll workers are also required to wear a mask.

Q. Early voting starts this week in the Union County Courthouse. I wanted to come in and vote early, but due to personal reasons I do not want to wear a mask. What can I do?

A. The good news is you have several options for cast-

and ethimoral cal character, and must demonstrate a genuine concern for community affairs. It is not surprising that the committee




#### No mask? Stay home.


#### To the Editor,

tween these groups is their response to the hormone ethylene. Ethylene is a hormone that plants produce to induce ripening. Climacteric fruits and veggies will continue to ripen after they have been picked. Non-climacteric fruits and veggies won't continue to ripen. Instead, they will soften and rot as they age. Some crops are sensitive to ethylene and so shouldn't be stored with climacteric crops that produce ethylene.

Apples, pears, peaches, plums, potatoes, and tomatoes are some examples of climacteric plants. Blueberries, blackberries, raspberries, cherries, cucumbers, eggplant, grapes, strawberries, peppers, squash, and watermelon are all examples of non-climacteric crops. Some examples of plants that are sensitive to ethylene and so shouldn't be stored with climacteric crops are asparagus, broccoli, cucumbers, green beans, kale, onions, peas, peppers, squash, and watermelon.

Now that we know a little more about the ripening process let's talk about how to tell when the best time to pick some of the most commonly grown crops around here are.

Tomatoes are an easy one to tell when they are ripe because they start to turn red. You can pick tomatoes before they are fully ripe on the vine. Because they are climacteric, they will continue to ripen. I've put tomatoes up in the kitchen windowsill so that they'll ripen. Sometimes it is advantageous to pick something before it's fully ripe so that you make sure critters don't get it before you.

Apples and pears can be a little more challenging to tell when they are ripe. Different varieties will ripen at different times. In addition, the entire tree may not ripen at the same time. If the apple or pear stem breaks away easily from the tree then it's ripe. Turn the fruit sideways to see if it pops off. Depending on the variety, you can use color to tell if the fruit is ripe. If you cut an apple open and the seeds are dark brown, it's ripe


Blueberries will be plump with a deep blue color. They also have a white powder on the skin that keeps them fresh longer.
