ing your vote. The first choice you have is to go to your local voting precinct on August 11th, which is the actual voting day, and you can cast your vote there. As of right now it will not be required to wear a mask in the voting precincts on election day, but please be aware that the Governor could always change that prior to election day. The second choice you have is to call the Registrar's Office at 706-439-6016 and request an Absentee Ballot. The last day to request an Absentee Ballot is August 7th, but the Registrar's Office recommends requesting it sooner, so you have enough time to get it back to them before Election Day on August 11th. The third choice you have is you may go online at sos.ga.gov, go to my voter page and follow the instructions to request a mail in ballot.

### Q. I personally feel like this is going overboard. Why does everyone feel all these precautions are necessary?

A. We are monitoring the responses to the Coronavirus outbreak, and we are following the guidance of local, state, and public health agencies and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). In order to reduce the risk of COVID-19 exposure for all people present in the Union County Courthouse, the court ordered that temperatures be taken, and masks are required. These measures are necessary to reduce the risk of exposure

for people visiting or working in the courthouse. Our goal here at the Courthouse is to remain open. If we were to end up having multiple positive cases the Courthouse would have to be shut down, along with many of our operations. We must also remember that attorneys and clients from many locations in Georgia and out of state end up in our courthouse and we have no idea who they are or where they came from.

### Q. I am so tired of all the Coronavirus talk and requirements, when will life go back to normal?

A. This is definitely a challenge and has been one on all of us. I do think some positives have come out of this because it has forced everyone to spend more quality time with their loved ones than what may have been planned and I do feel like everyone can always benefit from that. Unfortunately, until there are clear signs of abatement or reduced numbers from the Department of Public Health showing a number of reduced positive tests, we are all going to have to pull together and do our best to overcome this virus. It will take patience, kindness and understanding on all of our parts to come through this together but I have no doubt that we can and will do this together like we always do. This is what makes Union County so unique and such an awesome place to live. Thank you all for your consideration.

when they're 4-8 inches long. They'll both grow longer if left on the vine, and you can still eat them if they're big, but they get tougher as they age. You should be able to push your fingernail into the skin.

Sweet corn is ripe when you can puncture a kernel with your fingernail and milky fluid comes out. As soon as corn is picked, it starts to lose flavor. Refrigerate it to retain flavor.

Pick peas when the pods have plumped out. If they start to wrinkle, they're getting overripe. You can always open a pod to see if the seeds are swollen, but still tender. Beans are ready when you can see the seeds bulging through the sides of the pod.

Pick peppers when they are shiny green. If you let them

sit on the bush longer and they start to change to orange or red and they're getting hotter. If that's what you're looking for, let them sit.

black man, just like the horrific anarchy in the past weeks in Democrat held cities from the death of George Floyd.

I can't understand how such blatant lawlessness can occur in America today without being quelled immediately. For police to stand by and allow looting, vandalism and even murder without intervention is unfathomable.
