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to allow someone to ruin your peace and quiet over a long period of time without a fight, but at the same time we all have to accept a reasonable amount of sound.

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Q. What does the county consider to be unreasonable loud noises?

A. The number one problem we hear related to sound is a neighbor's barking dog. If a dog is barking all the time it is usually a sign that the pet is not happy about something. It can be a sound, movement, lonesome or sometimes the dog just wants to holler (bark). As a

homeowner, it is your responsibility to see to it that your dog does not bark all the time if it is obviously negatively impacting your neighbors.

The Animal Control officer from the Sheriff's Office is very well trained and is always able to offer advice and assistance.

Whether it be a barking collar, a fence, a dog house, food or just occasional attention, the pet owner has a responsibility to control their animals within reason

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first surfaced in 2000. At the request of the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Pentagon released some limited data about the nature of the tests, including the locations and the agents used. Since then, the VA has sponsored studies by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine in 2007 and 2016 to look at the effects of the secret tests.

While they found no significant difference in the health of veterans involved in the tests and those who were not, the authors acknowledged the difficulty of studying this issue.
"Our task was challeng-

ing because of the passage of time since the tests, and because many of the documents related to the tests remain classified," last year's report said. "Our requests for declassification of additional documents were not approved."

Lawmakers from both parties are pushing the House to endorse their demand this week when it considers a defense policy bill.

Reps. Mike Thompson, D-California, Don Young, R-Alaska, and Walter Jones, R-North Carolina, are trying to require the Secretary of Defense to declassify and disclose documents about the tests or tell Congress why he can't.

"It's been over 50 years since these tests were conducted and the DOD has yet to provide a complete accounting of what truly happened to our service members," Thompson said. "Veterans can't wait any

Veterans say they need answers to get the proper medical care.

In the Senate, Jerry Moran, R-Kansas, plans to push the veterans' agenda.

"We have a duty to make certain our service members health is protected both in and out of service, and providing access to classified military records that may prove exposure to toxic substances is critical to veterans applying for VA benefits and service-connection," Moran said in a statement.

saying yes does not.

While it is important to teach kids about why they should say no to drug and alcohol use, it is equally important to tell them how to say no. When a young person is put on the spot he or she doesn't have hours to explain that decision to peers; there is usually only a second or two. Without a plan in place, most kids will default to "yes" rather than suffer the awkwardness of the situation. Many tweens and teens have said yes to drug and alcohol use not because they were being rebellious, but because they simply did not know

It is important for parents to help their kids come up with ways to say no to drug or alcohol use and to practice saying no through role-playing scenarios. Parents should work with their kids in coming up with phrases that the child would feel comfortable using to say NO to the offer of alcohol or drugs. The following are some tips to help get the con-

versation started.

1. Offer to be the designated driver. Getting your friends home safely will make everyone glad you didn't drink or take drugs.

2. If you're on a sports team, you can say you are staying healthy to maximize your athletic performance—besides, no one would argue that a hangover would keep you from playing your best.

3. You could say: "I have to study for a big test, or visit my grandmother, or babysit. I can't do that after a night of drinking or drugs.'

4. Keep a bottled drink like a soda or iced tea with you to drink at parties. People will be less likely to pressure you to drink alcohol if you're already drinking something. If they still offer you something, just say "I'm covered."

5. When all else fails... blame your parents. Explain that your parents are very strict, or that they will check up on

I had no idea the vines in which I was hiding were Poison Ivy. In three days I had a rash that caused me to run a fever. My father knew someone who claimed to be immune to the stuff. They had gone "Coon Hunting" and the dogs had treed a big "Boar Coon" up a Yellow Poplar. However, they could not spot the coon due to all the leaves on the tree. Usually, in a situation like this my Dad would climb the tree and force the coon to jump out. But, this time the tree was covered in Poison Ivy and Dad knew he was allergic to the stuff. So, another man volunteered to climb the tree. He pulled off his shirt and shoes and rubbed the leaves all over his face.

He then climbed the tree and forced the "Coon" out of the tree. Three days went by before the man was taken to the hospital with a severe case of rash. But, the plant does have a good purpose.

You can see this example in February and March. Just walk through any woods and you will notice the tips of poison ivy vines have been nibbled upon. White-tailed Deer will actually eat the vines at this time of year because there is nothing else for them to eat.
