Softball: Season begins Monday; home opener on Tuesday

Union County rejoins a top-heavy region that features two of Class AA's top-three teams

The Stephen Mitchell-era officially gets underway on Monday, Aug. 6 when his Lady Panthers travel to Habersham Central for a 4 p.m. doubleheader.

The following day, Union County will host Pickens County in the 2018 home opener at 5:55 p.m. The junior varsity will play beforehand at 4 p.m.

Two days later, the Lady Panthers return the favor with a trip to Jasper to complete the home-and-home with the Lady Dragons. Thursday's 5:55 p.m. contest at Pickens County will conclude the opening week for Union County.

Week two opens Aug. 13 with Dawson County coming to town before the Lady Panthers visit Towns County and Lumpkin County. After hosting Towns County on Aug. 20, the Region 8-AA schedule gets underway Aug. 23 with a trip to Monticello to face the defending Class AA State Runner-Up.

Last season, Region 8-AA featured two teams that reached the Class AA Elite 8 in Columbus: Monticello and Banks County. However, it was Elbert County that finished atop the regular season standings before limping to a fourth-place finish in the region playoffs.

Social Circle, who defeated Union County in the 2015 Region 8-AA title game, placed third in the regular season before falling to Banks County in the Region 8-AA Championship

Both Social Circle (18-13) and Elbert County (9-14) would eventually get swept in the first round of the state playoffs.

Monticello, who lost 4-1 to Banks County in the region semis, bounced back with six consecutive postseason victories before falling 1-0 to Rockmart, the eventual State Champion, in the State Semifinals.

The Hurricanes squared

off with Banks County in the loser's bracket for the right to face Rockmart in the finals. Despite dropping its last meeting with the Lady Leopards, Monticello shutout Banks 2-0.

After consecutive lowscoring affairs, Monticello came up short in a 9-7 slugfest with Rockmart to finish 2017 with a 26-7 record that included a 4-0 win over Union County.

As for the Region 8-AA Champions, Banks County needed three games to knock off Pepperell in the first round. In the Sweet 16, they took care of Callaway, 3-1 and 8-0 to advance to Columbus.

Harlem would take down Banks in the opener but the Lady Leopards responded with three straight wins by a combined score of 14-1.

Their season would finally come to an end at the hands of region-rival Monticello. Banks County would complete 2017

improvement over 2016.

The 8-AA squads that missed the postseason were fifth place Oglethorpe County at 10-14 overall. The Lady Patriots dropped two-straight to Monticello in the best-of-three, Region 8-AA play-in series.

Sixth place belonged to Putnam County at 4-16. The War Eagles were routed 12-0 and 14-0 by Social Circle in the play-in series.

In last place was Rabun County, who finished with an 0-17 record. The Lady Cats dropped both meetings with Union County last year by a combined score of 27-9.

In order to compete for their first region title since 2011, the Lady Panthers must replace five starters from last season, including all-region selections Jillian Lawn and Katelynn Hodg-

Lawn was the workhorse of the Union County pitching with a 27-10 record - a 19-win staff in 2017, tossing 119.1 in-

nings. The Lady Panthers' two returning pitchers -- Megan Bright and Trinity Queen -- combined for just 35.2 innings last season. According to Coach

Mitchell, freshman Rebekah Kelley could also see action from the circle this fall. At the dish, Aladriel Ar-

nold returns for her fourth year as a starting outfielder. Arnold's .350 batting average and .500 slugging percentage are the highest among returning players, while also providing stellar defense in the outfield. Meanwhile, Arnold is the only returning starter from Union County's previous stint in Region 8-AA.

Joining her in the outfield is three-year starter Maddie Sutton, who hit .310 last season. The senior speedster scored 20 runs in 2017, tying with Arnold for the team lead among returning


