

## Softball: Expectations soar as opening day nears

Lady Panthers to host Haralson, Lumpkin and White this weekend

The 2020 edition of Union County softball gets underway at home this weekend, beginning with Friday's season opener vs. White County, followed by a pair of Saturday contests vs. Haralson County and Lumpkin County.

Third-year coach Stephen Mitchell is looking to take another step forward after guiding the Lady Panthers to consecutive 16-win campaigns and a pair of state playoff berths. But this fall marks the deepest, most experienced squad during Mitchell's tenure as Union County returns seven starters from a team that advanced to the Sweet 16 after nearly upsetting the eventual State Champion Banks County during the Region 8-AA title game.

"We have a lot of experience and I think that will really show this year, but the key for us is going to be putting runs on the board," Mitchell said. "That's been one of our biggest struggles the last few years."

To continue their upward trajectory in year-three under Mitchell, the Lady Panthers will once again lean upon senior pitcher Trinity Queen. As a junior, Queen earned Region 8-AA Pitcher of the Year honors, posting a 2.44 ERA and a 1.15 WHIP while fanning 81 batters to just 17 walks in 91 2/3 innings of work.

Queen, who splits time at first base, is also dangerous at the plate, especially in the clutch. In 2019, Queen led the team with nine two-out RBIs. Additionally, her 16 total RBIs are the most among returning players

Behind the plate is fouryear starter Hannah Patton, who began her career as a freshman infielder before moving to catcher midway through her sophomore year. Patton earned All-Region honors in 2019 after throwing out 30% of would-be base stealers and committing only two errors.

She also proved capable of handling the bat, finishing among the team's top-three in homers, doubles, triples and

.918 OPS, 32 hits, six doubles, position right now," Mitchell five stolen bases and two homers. The all-region lefty also ranked atop last year's squad with 22 runs and three triples; her 14 RBIs were third-most on the team.

The Lady Panthers return most of their starting infield minus shortstop Miranda Lockaby. Junior third baseman Caley Davis will anchor the hot corner after proving herself as one of the toughest strikeouts in Region 8-AA. In 75 plate appearances, Davis was the victim of only six Ks (five swinging, one looking).

Another junior infielder to keep an eye on is Emma Roxbury. As a sophomore, Roxbury's .328 batting average was third-highest on the team, as was her .348 OBP, .375 slugging and .723 OPS.

Other pitchers to watch are Tracy and freshmen Sierra Burnette and Jewell Massey.

"We have four pitchers with the potential to be our No. 2," Mitchell said. "For now, we're going to get them all some work in JV and varsity games and see which one is able to emerge. All you can do is give them each an opportunity to show what they're capable of."


"This weekend, we're going to try and get all the girls some work so we can see where we stand," Mitchell said.

Despite minimal practice time, Mitchell is confident the Lady Panthers are ready for action on Friday. And if they're not, it will be due to rust, which he feels every team is dealing with following restricted summer workouts.

"I think (the girls are ready to play), but if I had to guess, I would say every coach in the state is struggling a little since their teams haven't seen much live pitching," he said. "Pitching is usually a little ahead of hitting early in the season, and I think this year might be a little worse."

According to Mitchell, a scaled-back concession stand will be available this weekend. As for seating, social distancing is required by the GHSA, so fans unable to spread out in the bleachers or behind home plate are encouraged to bring lawn chairs and relocate around the outfield fence.

As previously reported, the extended dugouts will greatly reduce seating behind first and third base.
