you'll have somebody say they thought they saw smoke. But a lot of times, that's from the air bag. That air bag is packed with talcum powder or cornstarch, and that's a lubricant to get that airbag out.

"So, people see that, or steam from radiator fluid, and think they see smoke. But most of the time, when we're going to a car wreck, our main objective is to go there and do the extrication, the rescue part, and assist the EMS with the patients.

"When we have a fire, that's our primary job, is fire, so that changed the whole dynamic of the situation, and we had

to go into firefighting mode before we got into assisting the EMS.'

These kinds of fires are different from structure fires in that many things inside a car have the potential to explode or burn hotly.

"There's several other dangers you've got to look Chief Dyer is just thankful at," said Dyer. "There's fuel, there's gas-containing shocks you've got to look out for. So, you've got to approach it a lot different than you would a structure fire.

"It just burns. It'll really, really burn when it gets to the gas tank. They don't really blow up like the movies anymore. It's

just, when it gets to that point with the gas, it's going to start burning. A car on fire will usually spew extremely dense, black

smoke due to all of the foam and plastic burning inside the vehicle. Because of the potential for exposure to harmful gases, firefighters wear full gear when responding to car fires.

At the end of the day, that everyone made it out okay, especially since things could have gone much worse.

'If those people hadn't had seat belts on and they'd have had more significant injuries, then it would have been difficult for them to get out," said Dyer. "So, be careful, slow down, and make sure
