potentially getting stuck on the road, it's recommended that people get where they're going early and plan on staying there.

An absolute must for eclipse-watchers is proper eye protection, or eclipse glasses,

which can be purchased from the chamber through the day of the eclipse for \$2 a pair.

To avoid retinal burns and to safely view the eclipse during its partial phases, people will need to don their eclipse-viewing glasses practically

every time they look at the eclipse between when its partial phases begin at 1:05 p.m., and when the eclipse experience ends completely at 4 p.m.

Only during the roughly two minutes of "totality," occurring around 2:35 p.m. and ending around 2:37 p.m., can solar spectators safely remove their protective eyewear to view

the sun's corona shimmering around the outer edges of the moon.

It is during totality that the day sky becomes darkest, and a 360-degree sunrise/sunset effect can be seen all along the horizon.

As soon as the sun peeks back out on the other side of the moon, it's time to put the protective glasses back on, because "totality" will have come to an end and the partial phases of the eclipse will continue for about an hour and a half until it's all over.

The chamber has been thinking about the eclipse for the last year and a half, though plans really got underway earlier this year in March.

That's when the chamber rolled out its "Blairsville Eclipse Experience," presented by North Georgia Technical College Blairsville Campus.

The chamber has been a primary source for eclipse-viewing protective glasses, which double as keepsakes featuring the "Blairsville Eclipse Experience" branding, as do T-shirts available at the chamber to commemorate the historic event.

Initially, the chamber ordered some 11,500 pairs of eclipse glasses, and sold completely out by the last Friday in July.

Since then, the chamber has acquired another 7,200 pairs, so residents and visitors can still get glasses for the event.

Many local businesses will be getting in on the eclipse action, such as Chick-fil-A Blairsville, which will cater two of the chamber sponsored viewing parties and provide food to Vogel State Park that day.

The Eat Mor Chikin restaurant will be all hands on deck the day of the eclipse, and Chick-fil-A Blairsville owner/operator Daniel Liberatore expects to prepare thousands of sandwiches throughout the eclipse weekend and on that Monday, on par with Grand Opening sales.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime experience that people will be traveling from all over the world to see, and I don't think we'll see anything of this magnitude again in our lifetime," said Liberatore.

Like many local businesses, Copeland's Restaurant at Merchants Walk will be holding an eclipse viewing party in its parking area.

"People want to be outside and enjoy the eclipse," said Copeland's owner Ahleah Eberhardt. "Doing something different allows people to come in and enjoy the eclipse, and it helps the businesses around us. It's a good thing."

associated with the 2017 Directors election is a result of questions about the proper qualifications required for a member to be eligible to serve as a director.

While the bylaws are quite clear in most requirements, they are void of any clear definition of "member in good standing," and the board is taking steps to clarify that requirement for the membership's consideration in

2018 at the Annual Meeting.

"The Board of Directors doesn't vote on who is on the ballot, that's a decision by the Credentials Committee," said the EMC Board Secretary Roy Perren.

The Credentials Committee received direction by internal and external legal counsel to judge the nomination process by payment history, thus the "member in good standing" confusion regarding
