

## Volleyball: Inconsistency derails Union vs Dawson, Gilmer

Union County was unable to score its first win of 2020, dropping a pair of tightly-contested matches to Dawson County and at Gilmer.

Despite battling downto-the-wire in both contests last week, the Lady Panthers were unable to catch a break in the latter stages, allowing their Class AAA opponents to take six of the seven sets.

Union's lone set victory came on Tuesday in a 3-1 loss to seventh-ranked Dawson County in a match that saw Union County tied or ahead late in three of four sets.

"Dawson was a great match up, and it was incredible to see how we improved since our previous matches at Lumpkin," Union head coach Anna Chapman said. "We played much tighter matches and finally got a win in the third set. It felt good to see them overcome after two hard-fought sets. The scores of each set show just how close it was.'

Trailing 6-2, the Lady Panthers clawed ahead 11-7 in the opening stanza. After Dawson used an 8-2 spurt to snatch a 15-13 advantage, Union rattled off four-straight points for a 17-15 lead.

We are really going to work on coming out strong from the first serve and maintaining a lead."




