Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recognize that most people who get the flu will have mild illness, will not need medical care, and will recover in less than two weeks. Some people, however, are more likely to experience flu complications that can result in hospitalization and even death. Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections, and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications. People with chronic conditions like asthma and chronic heart failure may experience worsening health when triggered by influenza. Therefore, it is important for everyone six months and older to get vaccinated against influ-

The flu vaccine prevents the spread of the flu virus. Even during flu seasons like last year's (2017-18) when the virus changed slightly and the vaccine was not a perfect match, the vaccine provided some level of protection for those who had been vaccinated. When you are vaccinated, you protect not only yourself, but your family, friends and

Many myths persist about seasonal flu vaccine. Some of the most common are:

1. Myth: The flu shot will give me the flu. The flu shot is made from an 'inactive' virus and cannot give you the flu. However, some people experience mild symptoms from getting the flu shot, such as fever.

Myth: I have never had the flu so I don't need to get the flu shot. Many people are fortunate that they haven't been infected with the flu virus. However, many people are more susceptible to illness. The flu vaccine is important to protect others, especially young children and the elderly. Everyone benefits when more of the population is vaccinated.

3. Myth: I got the flu shot and still got the flu. When this happens, most likely the person was exposed to the flu virus right before getting vaccinated and the symptoms of flu had not yet appeared. In a few cases, research has shown that some people's immune system may not respond well to the vaccine and their bodies only build partial immunity. If this happens, the person generally has milder symptoms of the flu. Also, during the flu season, you could be exposed to other rhinoviruses, like the common cold, and you get sick.

4. Myth: It's no big deal to get the flu. Influenza is a serious illness that can lead to hospitalization and death, especially for high-risk populations such as the elderly and very young. Depending on the severity of the flu virus, each year the flu kills anywhere from 3,000 to 49,000 and sends about 200,000 to the

hospital. Myth: I'm young and healthy, so I don't need the flu shot. The CDC recommends everyone six months of age and older get vaccinated. That's because flu is a contagious disease that anyone can get. Flu can lead to serious illness, including pneumonia, even in healthy, young people. Healthy people can also spread the virus to others who are susceptible to illness, including newborn babies, senior citizens, and those with weakened
