the issues they are having on their road. Adding gravel when it is not needed can sometimes cause more problems. Just scraping the road can often times do away with potholes, ruts, and smooth the road up by pulling some of the existing gravel back to the surface. Our Road Department works very hard to make sure all our roads are kept in good condition without spending money unnecessarily.

Q. Who do I talk to re-

garding getting my private road accepted into the county-maintained road system?

A. The first step would be to contact the Road Department to see if your road would even qualify. There are specific conditions that the road has to meet in order to be considered for county maintenance. The Road Department can come out and look at the road and see if these conditions or right of way requirements have been met.

Unfortunately, eating marijuana is more dangerous than smoking it. The effects from smoking marijuana only take minutes. Edibles, however, take between one to three hours, because food is absorbed into the bloodstream through the liver. The amount of THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, is very difficult to measure and is often unknown in food, making overdose (especially if you don't know you're consuming

weed-laced food) more likely. If you're nervous about your teens accidentally consuming drug-laced foods at a party, make sure you share the quick tips below with them before they head out:

Think about how well you know the host. Close friends or family who are aware of your desire to be drug-free are less likely to knowingly expose you to laced goods. People you don't really know, though,

might not be as considerate. If you're suspicious, don't eat the candy or baked goods. Edible marijuana most commonly comes in these forms. Stick to the Doritos or other well-known packaged goods. Ask questions. Finally,

chat with other partygoers. Get the vibe of the crowd, learn more about the host (if you don't know him or her), find out who brought which dish and if you're still not sure,

Let your teen know that it's OK to go out and have fun! But there's nothing wrong with taking a little extra precaution iar surroundings.

Brownies are among the most common food products infused with marijuana, however, almost any food product may be infused with marijuana and eaten. In addition to placing marijuana directly in food, marijuana-infused cooking oil can be used when frying or searing food, and marijuanainfused butter can be spread

directly on prepared food. The amount of THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, is very difficult to measure and is often unknown in these food products. If the user has other medications in his or her system, their body may metabolize different amounts of THC, causing THC levels in the bloodstream to dangerously

increase five-fold. Overdose symptoms from eating marijuana are often more severe than symptoms of an overdose from smoking marijuana. Negative effects of marijuana edibles are psychotic episodes, hallucinations, paranoia, panic attacks and impaired motor ability. Seek immediate medical help if symptoms from drug-laced edibles are suspected.
