the other side.

Q. How can the public let GDOT know it is an unreasonable suggestion to close the road and that other alternatives should be considered?

A. The more details about how the road closure will negatively impact you, the county, or the people of Suches, the better. However, if you only have time to send a very simple letter to GDOT, it is much better than doing nothing. The important part is to send your comments in to GDOT.

Q. Even if I don't live in Suches, am I able to make a comment regarding this closure to GDOT?

A. Absolutely! The more comments they receive regarding this issue the better. We are extremely hopeful that once they are aware of how much of a hardship this will be on the community of Suches, and the people of Union County as a whole, they might be better able to figure out a different approach to replacing the bridge and detour options.

Q. How do we make a comment on the Highway 180 possible road closure project in Suches?

A. You can simply mail your comment card or letter

to GDOT at the following address: Mr. Eric Duff, Georgia Department of Transportation, 600 West Peachtree Street NW, 16th Floor, Atlanta, GA 30308. Or you can go to the Georgia Department of Transportation website at www.dot.ga.gov/PS/Public/PublicOutreach. From the menu, select the county in which the proposed project is located (Union) and click Go; then select 8/25/2016 – SR 180 at Slaughter Creek (Detour OH); Lastly, click Comment and follow the instructions to leave your comments. If you can in your letter or comment reference PI#: 0007055, County: Union, SR 180 at Slaughter Creek Detour to identify the project. All comments must be received by GDOT on or before September 8th, WHICH IS ONLY TWO WEEKS, so please write your note, comment, or letter NOW!

You can pick up a form from the Commissioner's office, the Wolfpen Gap Store in Suches, or at the Suches Community Center. At the public meeting Thursday, one of the GDOT employees said this was the largest crowd he had seen at one of their public meetings in 20 years. Yay for the people of Suches coming out and letting GDOT know of your concerns.

traveled to an area with Zika, do not have sex, or use condoms the right way, every time, during your pregnancy." They are also recommending that pregnant women should not travel to areas with Zika. Travelers who are returned from an area with Zika and who are infected can spread the virus through mosquito bites. Use precautions to prevent mosquito bites. Infected persons may not know that they are infected because the signs and symptoms can be very mild. There also is no treatment or vaccine at this time for the disease so prevention is the best practice.

vasive plants and trees portion of the workshop. Those who attend will not only learn what these plants are, but also best management practices of each species. "We're going to learn how to identify different fungal diseases, different insects that could be infecting trees and the forest environment, and that is actually going to give us what is called pesticide credit, says Mickey Cummings."

Chest/Chatt RC&D secured a grant from the USDA NRCS to hold field days with various topics and this Sep-TIMBER Forest and Ag field day at the GMREC will be the first in a series to be held here over the next 3 years. Some other topics will be soil health, alternative farming methods, seasonal high tunnels, organic farming, and other topics of interest to our farmers and landowners. Cost for the event is \$5 which will include a locally cooked lunch.

This is a multi-county program in which participation will be targeted primarily for

landowners in the Chestatee-Chattahoochee RC&D Council's area in Northeast Georgia as well as the area that the GMREC draws from, but will not be limited to these areas, so anyone is encouraged to attend. Come out and join with others who want to learn how we manage the only renewable natural resource that we have, our Forests.

A representative from the local Firewise Communities Program will also be making a presentation at the workshop. Firewise is program housed within the National Fire Protection Association that focuses on educating community members on how best to prevent wildfires in their neighborhoods.
