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## Audit puts EMC in clear; Annual meeting Saturday

YOUNG HARRIS -Aside from the Taylor and Taylor Construction debt, consisting of an unpaid power bill of more than \$62,000 from the company of former Blue Ridge Mountain EMC Director Terry Taylor, a thorough audit of the EMC's books has discovered no financial wrongdoing.

In a called meeting with members of area local media on Friday, Sept. 2, several of the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC Board of Directors relayed the findings of a recently completed forensic audit, which cost the EMC a total of \$75,981.47 to conduct.

The reason for

conducting the audit that was initially called for late last year, the board said Friday, was to address concerns of the membership over the financial health of the EMC, and also to lay the books bare to give any potential new general manager

a "clean slate." "The forensic analysis and examination of the books and records of the (BRMEMC) by DHG Forensics did not identify any apparent unauthorized disbursements or any additional abuses in the billing and collection process,' read Director Roy Perren from a statement by Richard Livingstone, the lead director of DHG Forensics.

Continued the statement: "As with every organization for which we conduct such examinations, we did identify

areas where we believe internal for BRMEMC has had any controls and policies could be strengthened and have provided recommended changes to the Blue Ridge Board and management to address those concerns.

"In the course of our examination, we found the knowledge, cooperation, and organization of the staff of Blue Ridge Mountain EMC to be commendable, which greatly assisted in the efficiency and effectiveness of this examination.

Last fall, the board selected the Forensics Accounting Group of Dixon, Hughes, Goodman LLC out of Charlotte, North Carolina, to do the audit, and "while one board member has used DHG for accounting at their business, no one on the board or working

previous dealings with the Forensic Accounting Group of DHG," said Perren Friday.

The audit, which started this spring and wrapped up recently, closely examined three years' worth of disbursements at a total of 12,300 checks amounting to \$72 million, spanning January 2012 through December 2014.

DHG found "no transactions that they believed required further investigation," according to the board's statement Friday.

The following areas were taken into account during the audit: cash disbursements, credit card charges and payments,

## Area businesses advised to keep no cash after hours

The Union County Sheriff's Office has a message for area businesses - don't keep cash on premises after hours

This warning comes after the Aug. 31 overnight burglary of the Marathon Station at the Georgia/North Carolina state line, in which five masked individuals disabled the store's security system before breaking in and removing the safe from the store, according to the sheriff's office.

After further investigation, the sheriff's office determined late last week that the individuals involved were likely not local. They are being considered as part of an organized group carrying out similar crimes

## **Blairsville man wanted** for rape arrested in NC

CLAY COUNTY, NC - A fugitive from Blairsville is in custody after a three-day manhunt that ended across state lines, according to the Union County Sheriff's Office.

Franklin Regeious "Reggie" Shook, 50, was arrested Saturday in Clay County, North Carolina, after being wanted in Union County since Thursday of last week, according to UCSO Lt. Daren Osborn.

Leading up to his arrest, Shook was wanted on two felony counts of rape, though he fled Union County before investigators could detain him, according to Lt. Osborn.

Once in custody Shook confessed to the crimes,
