Woods has been visiting various schools around the state to see how different systems are operating amid COVID-19. He's been gathering ideas as well as asking what he as an elected official can do for the

Hill said he would like for communication to improve between the school system and the Department of Public Health, but that he had the utmost confidence in the district's local COVID-19 Task Force consisting of doctors and others from the Blairsville community. Together, Woods, Hill,

Principal C.T. Hussion and an entourage of educators undertook an extensive walking tour of the high school, stopping to speak with teachers and students while discussing the various COVID mitigation practices implemented in Union From there, Hill took

Woods over to the primary school, where Principal Millie Owenby led him on a tour of the facility there, showing him the ways in which the school has come to embrace the successes and challenges of this year's virtual and in-class learning

Woods was impressed by the district's preparation, lauding both the robust online learning contingencies and the in-house contact tracing program in the inevitable event of COVID-19, to be assisted by systemwide assigned seating to limit the number of people

having to quarantine. "It seems to be a very unified group," Woods said of the overall effort. "With contact tracing, the plan there looks to be very efficient – what I've seen is a good job.

"I think we're looking at what could be for the future, and we're looking at some proactive things such as distance learning and what do we want to keep even after this passes.' Added Woods, "When

you look at how everyone's handling (returning amid COVID-19), it's a little bit different, but there are a lot of commonalities. Here, they have a great plan; they know that if X happens, this will be our next step.

"Looking at providing for needs of kids, of teachers – even those that have underlying conditions - I think they're being very respectful of that. They face some of the challenges

that other districts are facing and if they lose teachers, that

becomes problematic. "They're working it out that, if we do lose teachers where does that come from, or what is that potentially going

to do?" Hill let Woods know that everyone in Union County Schools was thankful for the state's help accessing critical hot spots for kids without home internet access, and he shared excitement for a good rest of the year as roughly 75% of students continue inperson instruction and 25% do online-only.

Before parting ways Thursday, Hill also made sure to tell Woods that his entire leadership team and all the schools were thankful for his and Lisha's trip to Union County, noting further his own gratitude that Woods seemed to really care and want to listen to local school systems.

"Y'all's success is our success," Woods said. "I want to thank you for allowing us to come up today. There will be some things that I take back and have discussions either internally or with the governor just so that we can make sure the school year goes well."
